NOTICE OF ELECTION

On Tuesday, Nov. 8, 2011, the City of Phoenix will conduct a Runoff Election in which city voters will elect a mayor and voters in Districts 1 and 5 will elect a council member. This election is required by the City Charter because no candidate for these offices received a majority of the votes cast for the office in the August Election.

Early Voting

Early voting begins on Thursday, October 13. Voters who received a ballot by mail for the August 2011 Mayor and Council Election will receive a ballot by mail for the Runoff Election. Voters who did not receive a ballot by mail for the August Election but who wish to vote early by mail may submit a signed, written request for an early ballot by mail. Forms will be available at http://phoenix.gov/ELECTION/ebr_form.pdf and at city public service counters and city libraries. The City Clerk must receive a voter's signed request for a ballot by mail no later than Friday, October 28.

Voting at the Polls

The City of Phoenix will be using voting centers for this election. Voters no longer are required to vote at a specified polling place in the voter's precinct for City of Phoenix elections. Any City voter can use any one of the 26 voting centers to cast a ballot. For voting convenience, the voting centers will be open on Saturday, November 5 from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., on Monday, November 7 from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m., and from 6 a.m. until 7 p.m. on Election Day, Tuesday, November 8. This new way of voting is only for elections conducted by the City of Phoenix. Maricopa County will also be conducting an election for several school districts within the City of Phoenix on November 8. There will be separate ballots for the two elections. Voters may vote by mail, or at the polls, in either election. CITY VOTERS WHO DO NOT VOTE BY MAIL ARE ENCOURAGED TO VISIT THE VOTING CENTERS ON SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 5 AND MONDAY NOVEMBER 7 TO VOTE IN THE RUNOFF ELECTION because polling places for the school district elections will be different than the City's Voting Centers on Election Day.
