

PHOENIX CITY COUNCIL FORMAL AGENDA

WELCOME!

You are now participating in the process of representative government. We welcome your interest and hope you and your friends will often attend Phoenix City Council meetings. Democracy cannot endure without an informed electorate. Phoenix utilizes a Council-Manager form of local government. Policy is set by the Mayor and Council who are elected by the people, and carried out by the City Manager, who is appointed by the Council. The Council decides what is to be done and the City Manager, operating through the entire City staff, does it. This separation of policy-making and policy administration is considered the most economical and efficient form of city government.

FORMAL CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

The Council acts on ordinances, resolutions and formal actions on an agenda at "formal" meetings on Wednesday at 3:00 p.m. "Formal" Meetings are generally held bi-weekly, but the schedule is subject to change. Please call the City Clerk Department at 602-262-6811 or visit http://phoenix.gov/citygovernment to confirm the date and time of the next formal meeting. Although this agenda is subject to change, all changes will be available 24 hours prior to the meeting.

The "formal" meeting may appear to proceed extremely fast, with important decisions reached after very little discussion. Actually, Council members receive the agenda the Thursday prior to the meeting. They have the opportunity to study every item on the agenda over the weekend and ask questions of City staff members. If no additional facts are presented at the "formal" meeting, they often act on matters, particularly routine ones, without further discussion.

HOW CITIZENS CAN PARTICIPATE

Citizens may appear before the City Council or a Council Subcommittee to express their views on any published agenda item. In addition, a Citizen Comment Session is held 15 minutes prior to and immediately following the formal City Council meetings which begin at 3:00 p.m.

If you have an individual concern involving the City, you are encouraged to contact your District Council member at 602-262-7029 or the City Manager's Office at 602-262-4449. To reach the Mayor's office, call 602-262-7111. We will do everything possible to be responsive to your individual requests.

REGISTERED LOBBYISTS

Individuals paid to lobby on behalf of persons or organizations other than themselves shall register with the City Clerk prior to lobbying or within five business days thereafter and must re-register annually. If you have any questions about registration or whether or not you must register, please contact the City Clerk's Office at 602-256-3186.

An assistive listening system is available in the Council Chambers for individuals with hearing loss. Headset units are available at the entrance table in the Chambers. In addition, the City Clerk's office will provide sign language interpreting services. Please call (voice) 602-256-3186 or (TTY) 602-534-2737 as early as possible to coordinate needed arrangements.

ORDINANCE G-5894 -AMEND CITY CODE - CHAPTER 10A -CONVENTION CENTERS AND THEATERS

Request to authorize amendments to Phoenix City Code Chapter 10A, Convention Centers and Theaters.

The purpose of these amendments is to update the code governing rates and operations of the Phoenix Convention Center, Executive Conference Center, Theatrical Venues, and Parking Facilities managed by the Phoenix Convention Center Department (PCCD) to provide increased competitiveness.

The amended ordinance will provide rates for booking future business through 2026. The recommended rates were posted to the City's website on October 30, 2013, to allow a minimum of 60 days for public comment; none were received.

Additionally, the amended ordinance will allow greater sales flexibility and speed to-market with competitive client proposals while establishing new opportunities for generating revenues in market-driven, business-friendly ways.

The text of the amended ordinance is contained in a backup report.

Financial Impact

No negative financial impact is expected from this action. The ability to establish competitive rates and offer incentives that increase the usage of the facility will allow the department to increase its revenues.

The proposed amendments to Chapter 10A, Convention Centers and Theaters, of the Phoenix City Code were recommended for City Council approval by the Downtown, Aviation, and Redevelopment Subcommittee on February 5, 2014.

The agreement may contain other terms and conditions deemed necessary or appropriate by the City Manager or the Aviation Director.

Further request to authorize the City Controller to disburse the necessary funds in an amount not to exceed \$90,000 annually over the life of the agreement.

AAAE is a not-for-profit organization that is the largest professional organization for airport executives in the world, representing thousands of airport management personnel at public-use airports. AAAE training will provide Aviation employees the specialized instruction needed to perform their jobs in the highly technical field of aviation. It will help Aviation employees to become familiar with the airport work environment and specialize in aviation specific areas that will focus on up-to-date industry regulations and standards. Due to the proprietary nature of the training programs, this is a sole source procurement.

The term of the agreement will be for one year. The agreement will contain four, one-year renewal options to be exercised at the sole discretion of the Aviation Director.

Financial Impact

The total cost of this agreement will not exceed \$90,000 per year for a total of \$450,000 if all options are exercised.

ORDINANCE S-40570 CORE PROGRAM AGREEMENT WITH
CHICANOS POR LA CAUSA FOR WEST SIDE
REGIONAL OFFICE RENOVATION

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into a Commercial Outreach Renovation and Enhancement (CORE) Program agreement and other agreements as necessary (collectively, the "Agreements") with Chicanos Por La Causa, Inc. (CPLC), or its City-approved designee, and for the City Controller to disburse funds for exterior renovations to the CPLC West Side Regional Office at 6808 West Indian School Road.

The CORE Program was developed as part of the 2006 General Obligation Bond Program to provide financial and technical assistance to property owners rehabilitating existing commercial properties, and improving existing blighted and underutilized properties within the West Phoenix Revitalization Area (WPRA).

Under this agreement, CPLC will be reimbursed for up to fifty percent of approved eligible costs for exterior renovations approved by the City, including façade renovations, landscaping upgrades, parking lot enhancements, improved signage and lighting, infrastructure improvements, and associated costs. The reimbursement will not to exceed \$82,775.

CPLC estimates its expenditures to improve this site will exceed \$3,000,000, including \$300,000 for exterior improvements. CPLC is establishing this location as its West Side Regional Office, offering various behavioral health and human services to the community including a small business lending program, a health clinic, housing counseling, a community conference center, and other uses.

The Agreements with CPLC may contain such other terms and conditions as the City deems necessary or appropriate to complete the transaction.

Financial Impact

There will be no impact to the General Fund as a result of entering into these Agreements. The contract value shall not exceed \$82,775. Funds are available in the Community and Economic Development Department's Capital Improvement Program budget using 2006 General Obligation Bonds designated for economic development activities in the West Phoenix Revitalization Area.

This project was approved by the WPRA Community Advisory Board at its October 17, 2013 meeting.

This item is also recommended by Mr. Blue, Ms. Spencer, and the Community and Economic Development Department.

ITEM 28 DISTRICT 7

ORDINANCE S-40571 -REDEVELOPMENT AND PURCHASE AGREEMENT WITH METROWEST DEVELOPMENT, LLC

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into a Redevelopment and Purchase Agreement, easements, and other agreements as necessary with Metrowest Development, LLC, or its City-approved designee (Developer), and for the City Controller to accept and disburse funds for the redevelopment of three City-owned properties located at 814, 816, and 822 North Second Avenue as single-family, owner-occupied residences.

Staff solicited proposals for the private financing and rehabilitation of two parcels with historic structures and the development of a vacant lot within the Roosevelt Historic District. Developer was recommended by an evaluation panel which included representatives of the Roosevelt Action Association, downtown stakeholders, and City staff.

Under the proposed business terms, Developer will rehabilitate the three properties for use as single-family, owner-occupied residences. Developer will accept a covenant to protect the historic structures and their view sheds for 25 years, and a covenant requiring that all parcels be devoted only to owner occupied residential use for 10 years. Developer will enter into a Second Avenue Streetscape Right-of-Way Maintenance Agreement for each parcel.

Developer will pay the City \$82,047, \$96,616, and \$81,375 for parcels 822, 816, and 814, respectively (Purchase Price). If Parcels 816 and/or 822 sell for amounts in excess of the Developer's anticipated gross sales prices (\$386,465 for Parcel 816 and \$328,190 for Parcel 822), Developer will pay the City fifty percent of the excess sales proceeds.

The agreements may contain such other terms and conditions as the City deems necessary and appropriate.

Financial Impact

There will be no impact to the General Fund as a result of entering into these agreements.

This item was unanimously recommended by the Downtown, Aviation, and Redevelopment Subcommittee on February 5, 2014.

This item is also recommended by Mr. Blue, Ms. Takata, the Community and Economic Development Department, and the Neighborhood Services Department.

ITEM 29 OUT OF CITY

ORDINANCE S-40572 -FOREIGN-TRADE ZONE APPLICATION FOR ISOLA USA, CORPORATION

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to submit a Minor Boundary Modification application to the Foreign-Trade Zones (FTZ) Board of the U.S. Department of Commerce. Also, request authorization to enter into a Foreign-Trade Zone Operations Agreement and any other necessary documentation with Isola USA, Corporation, or City-approved nominee, and to enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement with the City of Chandler.

The City of Phoenix, as Grantee of Foreign-Trade Zone 75, has the right and authority to apply for foreign-trade zone site designations. Isola USA, Corporation designs, develops, manufactures, and markets laminate materials used to fabricate advanced multilayer printed circuit boards, which provide the physical platforms for the semiconductors, passive components, and connection circuitry that power and control virtually all modern electronic products. The company has requested a usage-driven designation for the property it owns at 165 South Price Road, Chandler, Arizona. The proposed usage-driven site consists of approximately 17 acres. Consistent with City of Phoenix policy, Isola does not intend to seek property tax reclassification for existing property within the City of Chandler pursuant to Arizona law (Arizona Revised Statutes 42 12006).

The City of Chandler has provided to the City of Phoenix a resolution indicating their support of Isola's FTZ application for the site in Chandler. With Council authorization, the City of Phoenix will enter into an Intergovernmental Agreement with the City of Chandler to evidence conditions of Chandler's support of the FTZ application and outline the cities' responsibilities to one another.

City staff will prepare an Operations Agreement with Isola requiring the company to:

- Comply with U.S. Department of Commerce Foreign-Trade Zones Board standards;
- Maintain record keeping satisfactory to the U.S. Customs and Border Protection;
- Obtain business bonding and insurance satisfactory to the City and the U.S. Customs and Border Protection;
- Indemnify the City against claims arising from their FTZ operations; and
- Pay to the City all fees pursuant to the current zone fee schedule.

The agreement will contain such other terms and conditions deemed necessary or appropriate.

Financial Impact

The City will incur no costs associated with Isola's application.

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into an agreement with Siemens Water Technologies LLC, Inc. to provide arsenic adsorption media on a month-to-month basis for up to six months, beginning on or about January 29, 2014 and ending July 29, 2014. Authorization is also requested for the City Controller to disburse funds over the life of the contract in an amount not to exceed \$99,000.

The Finance Department issued solicitation IFB 13-129 on February 28, 2013. As all bids in response to this solicitation were ultimately deemed non responsive, staff cancelled the solicitation. The Water Services Department completed a pilot study in fall 2013 which provided information for new types of media that will meet the minimum requirements for arsenic adsorption. This information will be used for a new bid (scope) process. Establishment of an interim contract with Siemens is necessary to ensure that arsenic adsorption media for removing arsenic from groundwater and for treating water at the City well sites is not

interrupted, until the new bid process can be completed.

Financial Impact

The aggregate contract value shall not exceed \$99,000, with an estimated monthly expenditure of \$16,500. Funds are available in the Water Services Department's Operating budget.

RFA 14-037 - TRAPEZE SOFTWARE MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into an agreement with Trapeze for the purchase of a software maintenance agreement for the Public Transit Department. Authorization is also requested for the City Controller to disburse funds over the duration of the contract in an aggregate amount not to exceed \$373,000.

The Public Transit Department currently uses Trapeze PASS and PASS-MON software for the scheduling and coordination of Dial-A-Ride trips. Trapeze is the developer of the software and only Trapeze is able to provide the ongoing maintenance and support of the software.

Funds are available in the Public Transit Department's budget utilizing Transit 2000 funds.

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to make purchases against the Maricopa County contract with CPC Construction, Inc. for traffic signal loop installation services on an as-needed basis. Authorization is also requested for the City Controller to disburse funds over the life of the contract in an amount not to exceed \$400,000.

The loop detector installation services is required by Street Transportation Department Traffic Signal Section to allow for resources to replace damaged loops due to major street projects like the Light Rail Northwest Extension, Grand Avenue Improvements, overlay projects, and restoration projects.

ORDINANCE S-40586 GRANT OF A PUBLIC UTILITY EASEMENT FOR
A CITY PROJECT - 5855 NORTH ECHO CANYON
PARKWAY

Request authorization to grant a public utility easement, for consideration of one dollar, for the installation of a new service to a City facility on City property in the Arizona Public Service (APS) service area, and further ordering the ordinance recorded. This easement is needed to provide utilities and other services to the Echo Canyon Trailhead located at 5855 North Echo Canyon Parkway.

This public utility easement will be for the area described in the legal description to be sent directly to the Law Department ("Easement Premises") and will be granted to all public service corporations and telecommunication corporations providing utility service to the property located at 5855 North Echo Canyon Parkway, (collectively "Grantee") in perpetuity, so long as the Grantee uses the Easement premises for the purposes herein specified, subject to the following terms and conditions:

- A. Grantee is hereby granted the right to construct, reconstruct, replace, repair, operate, and maintain utility facilities together with appurtenant fixtures for use in connection therewith for the transmission and distribution of utility and communication facilities (collectively "Grantee Facilities") to, through, across, and beyond Grantor's property within the Easement Premises. Subject to the notice requirements provided in Paragraph "I", Grantee shall at all times have the right of full and free ingress and egress to and along the Easement Premises for the purposes herein specified. Grantee acknowledges and accepts that Grantee shall share the Easement Premises with other Grantees and shall use such Easement Premises with other Grantees in accordance with and consistent with industry standards and customs for such shared use. Grantor agrees to coordinate the location of Grantee's Facilities within the Easement Premises and to pay costs for relocation of Grantee's Facilities as provided in Paragraph "F".
- B. Grantor shall not locate, erect or construct, or permit to be located or erected or constructed, any building or other structure or drill any well within the limits of the Easement Premises. However, Grantor reserves all other rights, interests, and uses of the Easement Premises that are not inconsistent with Grantee's easement rights herein conveyed and which do not interfere with or endanger any of the Grantee Facilities. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Grantor shall not have the right to lower by more than one foot or raise by more than two feet the surface grade of Easement Premises without the prior written consent by the Grantee whose facilities will be affected by the change of elevation.
- C. Grantee shall not have the right to use the Easement Premises to store gasoline or petroleum products, hazardous or toxic substances, or flammable materials; provided however, that this prohibition shall not apply to any material, equipment or substance contained in, or a part of, the Grantee Facilities, provided that Grantee must comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations in connection therewith. Additionally, the Easement Premises may not be used for the storage of construction-related materials or to park or store construction-related vehicles or equipment except on a temporary basis to construct, reconstruct, replace, repair, operate, or maintain the Grantee Facilities.
- D. Grantor shall maintain a three-foot clear area around all edges of all equipment pads for Grantee Facilities, in addition to a clear operational area that extends 10 feet immediately in front of all transformer or switching cabinet openings, within the Easement Premises. No obstructions, trees, shrubs, fixtures, or permanent structures shall be placed or permitted by Grantor within said areas.

Grantee is hereby granted the right to trim, prune, cut, and clear away trees, brush, shrubs, or other obstructions within said areas.

- E. Grantee shall exercise reasonable care to avoid damage to the Easement Premises and all improvements thereon and agrees that following any work or use by Grantee within the Easement Premises, the affected area, including without limitation, all pavement, landscaping, concrete and other improvements permitted within the Easement Premises pursuant to this easement will be restored by Grantee to as close to original condition as is reasonably possible, at the expense of Grantee.
- F. Grantor reserves the right to require the relocation of Grantee Facilities to a new location within Grantor's property; provided however, that: (1) Grantor pays the entire cost of redesigning and relocating existing Grantee Facilities to the new location; and (2) Grantor provides Grantee with a new and substantially similar public utility easement at no cost to Grantee. After relocation of Grantee Facilities to the new easement area, Grantee shall abandon its rights to use the Easement Premises granted in this easement without cost or consequence to Grantor.
- G. Each public service corporation and telecommunication services corporation as a Grantee shall coordinate and work with other Grantees in the use of the Easement Premises. In the event that a third party or other Grantee requests the relocation of existing Grantee Facilities to a new location (whether or not) within the Easement Premises, the requesting party shall pay the entire cost of redesigning and relocating the existing Grantee Facilities.
- H. Grantee shall not have the right to transfer, convey or assign its interests in this easement to any individual, corporation, or other entity without the prior written consent of Grantor, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Grantee shall notify Grantor of any proposed transfer, conveyance or assignment of any rights granted herein at the address listed below.
 - I. Except in emergencies or exigent circumstances such as service restoration, Grantee agrees to contact Grantor at least one business day prior to Grantee's entrance onto the Easement Premises where the Easement Premises are located: (1) on a site that includes Aviation Department facilities, water and wastewater treatment facilities, the Police Department headquarters located at 620 West Washington Street, the Fire Department headquarters located at 150 South 12th Street, City Hall located at 200 West Washington Street, City Court Building located at 300 West Washington Street, Calvin C. Goode Building located at 251 West Washington Street, Transit Operations Center located at 320 North 1st Avenue, or West Transit Facility located at 405 North 79th Avenue; or (2) in a secured or fenced area.

This bears the recommendation of the Street Transportation Director and the Deputy Finance Director, with the concurrence of the Acting Parks and Recreation Director.

The easement area contains approximately 12,083 square feet and is located within City of Phoenix right-of-way along Broadway Road between 2nd Street and Central Avenue. SRP requires the easement in order to accommodate the Broadway Road (Avenida Rio Salado) street improvement project at this location.

Further request the City Council to grant an exception pursuant to Phoenix Code § 42-20 to authorize inclusion in the documents pertaining to this transaction of indemnification and assumption of liability provisions that otherwise would be prohibited by Phoenix City Code § 42-18.

Request retroactive authorization to apply for a \$30,000 grant from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation - Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration Program, and request authorization for the City Manager, or his designee, to accept the funds, if awarded. Request further authorization for the City Controller to accept and disburse funds.

In 2013, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) partnered with the Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration Program for community initiatives designed to develop community stewardship of local natural resources, preserve these resources for future generations, and enhance habitat for local wildlife.

If awarded, the Neighborhood Services Department (NSD) will partner with the Wilson Elementary School District located in the area of 30th Street - 30th Place from Van Buren to Fillmore streets for a school improvement project. The project will transform the barren landscape areas surrounding the school back into a riparian habitat that supports biodiversity, reduces the urban heat island effect, captures storm water and improves water quality, increases tree canopy coverage, and provides an environmental education opportunity for students and the community. These funds will ultimately benefit the environment by providing shade cover, decreasing surface temperatures, and creating more walkable streets for the community.

In addition, NSD and the Wilson Elementary School District will partner with surrounding neighborhood organizations to raise awareness on environmental stewardship.

Financial Impact

No additional City funds will be required to provide services under this grant.

ORDINANCE S-40589 -CONTRACTS FOR ARTISTS' INITIATIVE VI TEMPORARY PUBLIC ART PROJECTS

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into contracts with Sama Alshaibi (AZ); Chris Fraser (CA); David Politzer (TX); and Michael Robinson (NY), for an amount not to exceed \$3,500 each to work with City staff and the community to present temporary video projections at select sites along the Light Rail Corridor near Margaret T. Hance Park. The projects will be part of Phase II of the "Cultural Connections" series of temporary public art projects funded through the City's Artists' Initiative VI Temporary Public Art Project and a National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) "Our Town" grant. Authorization is also requested for the City Controller to disburse the funds over the life of the contract.

The Artists' Initiative VI Public Art Project is one of 60 projects in the Fiscal Year 2013-2018 Public Art Project Plan approved by City Council on July 3, 2013. It includes \$54,417 in City funds and \$65,000 in NEA funds, for a total of \$119,417. The \$14,000 (\$3,500 each) in proposed artist contracts will cover all costs related to leasing the videos. The remaining \$105,417 will go toward paying the costs of production, project administration and documentation, and the development of the additional temporary projects commissioned through the "Cultural Connections" series.

The project covered by these contracts will be part of Phase II of the "Cultural Connections" series of temporary public art projects and events that the Phoenix Office of Arts and Culture has developed in partnership with the Arizona State University (ASU) Museum of Art Desert Initiative and Roosevelt Row Community Development Corporation to activate underutilized yet highly visible and accessible public sites near Roosevelt Row and Margaret T. Hance Park.

This item was reviewed and approved by the Phoenix Arts and Culture Commission on January 15, 2014.

IMPROVEMENT FORMULA GRANT

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into a grant agreement between the Phoenix Police Department and the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (ACJC) through the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Formula grant. Grant funds were awarded, in an amount not to exceed \$42,633. The funding period is October 1, 2013 through September 30, 2014. Grant award documents were received from ACJC on January 2, 2014. Authorization is also requested for the City Controller to receive and disburse funds.

The Police Department's Crime Lab is committed to implementing innovative solutions to the issues facing many crime laboratories nationwide. Over the past six years, the Crime Lab has made significant strides in addressing these issues by utilizing these grant funds as part of a comprehensive approach to support and enhance the services provided to the criminal justice community. These funds will be utilized for overtime and related fringe benefits to improve the timeliness of forensic science services and to address backlogs in the analysis of forensic evidence.

The Public Safety and Veterans Subcommittee recommended City Council approval on February 12, 2014.

No matching funds are required; cost to the City is in-kind resources only.

GROUP FOR SOLID WASTE
CHARACTERIZATION STUDY

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into an agreement with Cascadia Consulting Group for the development of a comprehensive characterization study of solid waste materials collected from residential contained collection customers during the contract period beginning on or about March 1, 2014 and ending February 28, 2016. Authorization is also requested for the City Controller to disburse funds over the duration of the contract.

Solicitation RFP14-SWD-025 for Solid Waste Characterization Study was conducted in accordance with Administrative Regulation 3.10. Two proposals were received by the Public Works Department on December 18, 2013. The proposals were scored by a five-member evaluation committee based on the following criteria: approach and strategy, qualifications and experience, and pricing. Proposers also made presentations to the evaluation team for further evaluation. The evaluation team has recommended Cascadia Consulting Group be accepted as the highest scored responsive and responsible proposer.

The study will determine if the education and diversion over the past 10 years have been effective as well as benchmark current waste composition. The study will also provide needed data to guide diversion decisions for future programs necessary to achieve the City's waste goal of 40 percent diversion by 2020.

Option to Extend

Provisions of the agreement include an option to extend the contract up to three additional years, in one-year increments, which will be exercised if considered in the City's best interest to do so.

Financial Impact

The aggregate contract value for all option years will not exceed \$648,662, with an estimated expenditure of \$450,000 over the initial two-year contract period. Funds are available in the Public Works Department's Operating budget.

Request to authorize the City Manager, or his designee, to enter into an agreement with Black & Veatch Corporation, Phoenix, Arizona, to provide construction administration and inspection services in support of the Deer Valley Water Treatment Plant 20 million gallon (MG) Reservoir #1 Replacement project. Further request to authorize the City Controller to disburse funds for the

purpose of this ordinance.

The Black & Veatch Corporation was chosen for this project using a qualifications-based selection process as authorized by Title 34 of the Arizona Revised Statutes.

This project requires the demolition of the existing reservoir and the installation of the new concrete reservoir. Construction services for this project will be provided through the Construction Manager at Risk (CMAR) delivery method. Construction administration and inspection services include, but are not limited to: representing the City on behalf of the project; managing the construction schedule; performing site visits; reviewing shop drawing and test results; interpreting and clarifying contract documents; certifying progress payments; performing substantial and final completion inspections; performing materials testing; providing the services of an on-site inspector throughout the construction; and performing special services as may be identified for the project.

Financial Impact

The engineer's fee shall not exceed \$1,858,155, including all subconsultant and allowable costs. Funding for these services is available from the Water Services Department's Water Revenue Fund (0051).

This Council award is subject to execution of the agreement by all of the parties.

The Water Services Department concurs with this request.

The contract may contain other terms and conditions deemed necessary or appropriate by the City Manager, or his designee. Further request authorization for the City Controller to disburse the necessary funds for the purpose of this ordinance in an amount not to exceed \$538,451.

Report of six bids received in compliance with Arizona Revised Statutes, Title 34, by the Street Transportation Department on December 10, 2013, to provide construction services in support of the ITS Fiber Optic Backbone Phase B-2 construction project. The six bids were sent to the Equal Opportunity Department for review to determine subcontractor eligibility and general contractor responsiveness in meeting the project's Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) goal. DECLARE 2015 NFL SUPER BOWL ACTIVITIES IN DOWNTOWN PHOENIX AS SPECIAL PROMOTIONAL EVENTS

Request authorization declaring that for the three-week period before the National Football League (NFL) Super Bowl XLIX game on Sunday, February 1, 2015, all Official Events and other NFL and Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee sanctioned activities that are held in the Downtown Redevelopment Area will be considered special promotional and civic events for the purposes of the Zoning Ordinance.

It is anticipated that certain NFL game-related activities will take place in downtown Phoenix in the weeks prior to and after the game. These events and activities will bring significant revenue and media exposure to the city of Phoenix during the event period. Phoenix Zoning Ordinance, Section 705.F.1.b, provides that advertising devices otherwise prohibited by the Zoning Ordinance may be erected in the Downtown Redevelopment Area, subject to a use permit, in conjunction with special promotional events of a civic or commercial nature. By declaring the NFL and Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee-sanctioned activities as special promotional and civic events, this resolution allows the NFL, NFL approved sponsors, and Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee to advertise Official Events in the Downtown Redevelopment Area by use of signs, banners, and similar devices. This action will not impact any existing permitted permanent signs in downtown. This declaration will restrict all temporary signage within the Downtown Redevelopment Area that has not been authorized by the NFL and/or Arizona Super Bowl Host Committee during the above-mentioned time period in order to support NFL event-related activities.

Financial Impact

No General Fund monies will be used for this action.

SUBMIT FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR 2015 GRANT PROPOSALS FOR FUNDS AVAILABLE THROUGH THE ARIZONA GOVERNOR'S OFFICE OF HIGHWAY SAFETY

Request authorization to submit grant proposals for funding administered by the Arizona Governor's Office of Highway Safety (GOHS). GOHS announced the availability of funding on December 27, 2013. Grant proposals are due February 28, 2014. These funds will be used to support new traffic safety programs and enhance existing programs in the City Prosecutor's Office, Street Transportation, Fire, and Police Departments. If approved, the anticipated funding period is from October 1, 2014 through September 30, 2015. The total amount being requested is \$1,528,982.

Pursuant to the Highway Safety Act of 1966, grant projects are funded through grants from the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA) and administered by the Arizona GOHS. The level of traffic safety in Phoenix is largely dependent upon the success of existing and proposed traffic safety programs.

GOHS grant funds would be used to support the following education, enforcement, and safety programs:

Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor

The grant funds will be used to pay the salary, expenses, supplies, and travel for an existing Traffic Safety Resource Prosecutor, Attorney IV.

Street Transportation Department

Total Funding Requested - \$153,000

Roadway Safety/Education Programs

This funding will help develop and enhance educational campaigns and employee training on roadway, school, bicycle and pedestrian safety.

Fire Department

Total Funding Requested - \$150,000

Funding will be requested for overtime and related fringe benefits, materials, and equipment related to high school education campaigns to inform and remove alcohol and other drug impaired drivers from the road, decreasing injuries and fatalities. Total funding requested: \$21,000

Occupant Protection - Child Car Seats

Funding will be requested for training, overtime, related fringe benefits, materials, and equipment related to child safety seats and seat belt usage.
