Friday Night Rollover Collision

(December 15, 2024) Phoenix Police Vehicular Crimes detectives investigate a deadly collision in west Phoenix that ended with a vehicle on the I-17 barrier.

On December 13, 2024, around 10:30 p.m., officers responded to a serious injury collision in the area of West Indian School Road and the I-17. Officers arrived and located a three-vehicle collision with two adult males suffering from critical injuries.

Detectives responded to take over the investigation. Preliminary information suggests that the driver of unit 1, an Infiniti G37 sedan, operated by 30-year-old Daniel Jacobs was eastbound on Indian School Road when he failed to stop for the red light at the southbound access Road and he collided with Unit 2, who was southbound on the access road. Unit 1 left the roadway and crashed through the chain link fence dropping about 30 feet onto the southbound Interstate 17, where he was struck by Unit 3 who was southbound on the I-17. Unit 1 came to rest on the I-17 mainline against the median barrier. The driver was extricated and transported to a local hospital where he died a day later.

Unit 2, a Toyota Tacoma, operated by a 29-year-old male was southbound on the southbound I-17 access road proceeding through the green light at Indian School Road when he collided with Unit 1. Unit 2 rolled and came to rest in the curb lane of eastbound traffic. The driver was extricated and transported to a local hospital where he remains in critical condition.

Unit 3, a GMC Sierra truck, operated by a 39-year-old male was southbound on the Interstate 17 when Unit 1 came off Indian School Road and Unit 3 collided with Unit 1.

Additional details about the collision remain part of the ongoing investigation.
