What's New in the Volunteer Program - An Update from Amereece

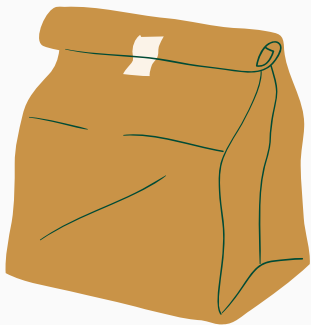
Fingerprinting Procedure

We now have an approved Fingerprint Procedure along with billing accounts. Volunteers who work with our school groups are required to have a Fingerprint clearance card. Volunteers who are required to have a fingerprint card will receive an email in January with instructions on how to complete this process. If you receive this email, please complete this process as soon as possible. If you have not received an email with instructions on completing the fingerprinting process, it means that your volunteer position does not require a fingerprint clearance card, and no action is needed from you. If you have any questions about whether you need to obtain a fingerprint clearance card, please feel free to reach out to me, and I can provide you with that information.

Stabilization of the Va'aki - A Mudslingers Update by Brian

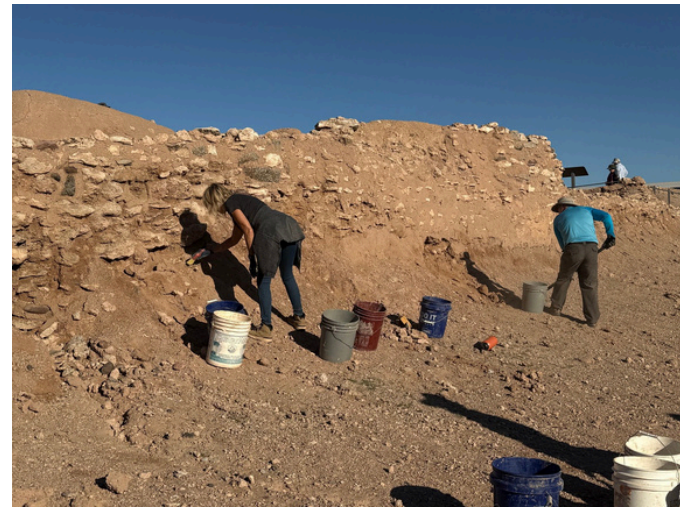
S'edav Va'aki is home to one of the few remaining platform mounds in Arizona, and preserving such a large earthen structure is as much of a community effort as was its construction. The process of using Adobe to stabilize the structure is done in a manner that emulates the methods used in the original building of the mound, providing the best and most historically accurate technique to ensure the site's ongoing preservation. For many years now, the group known as the Mudslingers has completed this work, and the activity involved very much lives up to the name. "Puddled adobe", the construction style utilized by the Ancestral O'odham, involves the throwing of adobe during application, with the force of impact being crucial in ensuring proper adhesion, which is a critical component of any earthen architecture construction.





Stabilization of the Va'aki Continued

From mixing the adobe using material at the site, to hauling buckets and water to the throwing itself, our volunteers are putting in the hard work it takes to keep the cultural heritage of the site preserved in a way that allows our visitors to see, up close and in person, the architectural and engineering prowess of the Ancestral O'odham. Similar historical sites around the Southwest utilize more permanent and modern stabilization techniques, which inevitably degrade and remove the essence of what makes a place like S'edav Va'aki special. By preserving the structure in the same way and with the same materials it was constructed, we honor the legacy of the history of the O'odham in the Salt River Valley by rolling up our sleeves, slinging some mud, and maintaining one of the only places left we can connect to the past this way.





Volunteers Help Make Learning Fun -

The S'edav Va'aki Museum Education Crew has been busy since our grand re-opening in October! We've hosted many school groups visiting multiple times a week and even a few on weekends, including energetic robotics clubs interested in archaeology. We've painted hundreds of plaster petroglyphs for the school crafts and helped with event days filled with educational information and activities for our guests.

A huge part of how we are able to accomplish all of this is due to our wonderful volunteers. Our Engagement Guide Volunteers have stepped up to give introductions to school groups, as well as present the artifact cart for field trips and on event days. You have painted broken, plaster pieces, which are then given to students so that they can create their own petroglyphs. In addition, our Engagement Guide Volunteers have helped pass out craft materials to school groups, inspired students to be creative, and assisted with cleaning up the inevitable plaster dust mess. The petroglyphs you helped create are also brought to outreaches so that members of the community can participate and learn about the importance of preserving sacred sites.
