West Camelback Corridor Community Outreach




Since January, we have been walking the neighborhoods of the West

New Bike Lanes and Parking in Maryvale



The City of Phoenix Street Transportation Department continues to make improvements to our roadways, and a major focus is making neighborhood streets safer with more bicycle and pedestrian friendly updates. The Street

Transportation Department is proposing an update to the parking and bike lanes on 55th Avenue from Thomas Rd. to Camelback Rd. and 45th Ave. from the Grand Canal to Camelback Rd.

The Cool Corridor project, which was completed this past fall, includes 200 newly planted trees, a newly paved walkway along the one-mile median on 55th Ave. from Camelback Rd. to Indian School Rd. The proposed bike lanes will add another option for the residents to enjoy the Cool Corridor. Click here to let us know where you would like the bike lanes and parking on 55th Ave.
