Homeless Programs

The Homeless Programs Section supports homeless services through contracts with community-based organizations to provide emergency shelter, transitional housing, permanent supportive housing and other supportive services for homeless families and individuals.

The Watkins Emergency Shelter Program provides year-round emergency shelter and a range of services for single females and families. Services include sleeping accommodations, meals, health care, supervised activities for children, behavioral health services, case management and clothing.

Summer and Winter Respite Programs coordinate the collection of essential items to be distributed to homeless people living on the streets of Phoenix. Items including water, sunscreen, hats, hygiene items, clothing, blankets and shoes are donated by the community and distributed by local street outreach teams.

The Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP) is HUD's implementation of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) Homelessness Prevention Fund and will provide financial assistance and case management services to prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless and help those who are experiencing homelessness to be quickly re-housed and stabilized.
