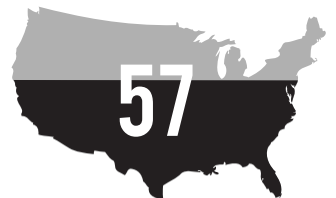

SAVED from anti-spiking measures passed by the City Council in October. The plan – endorsed by the Greater Phoenix Chamber of Commerce – eliminated city employees' ability to count car and cell phone allowances, as well as payouts for unused sick and vacation leave, toward a pension.

SAVED by requiring future city employees to pay half the cost of their pensions – a plan **approved by 80% of voters**.

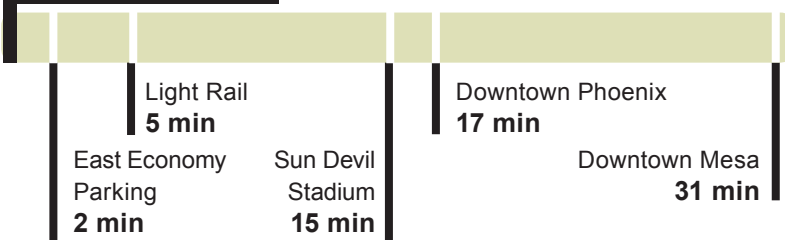

CREATING A MORE URBAN, VIBRANT DOWNTOWN

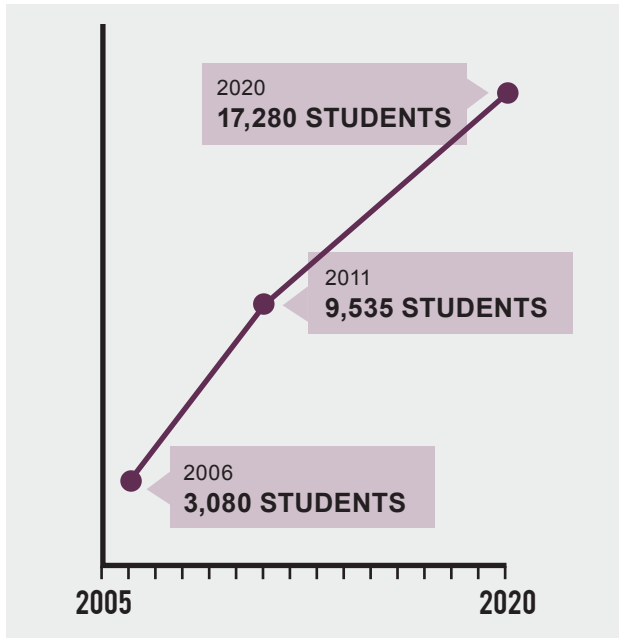

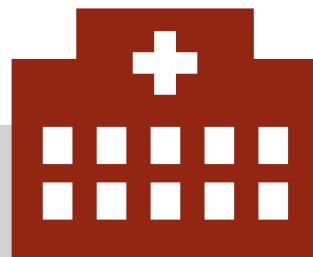
INNOVATIVE IDEAS LIFT LOCAL ECONOMY

When Phoenix hospitals faced half a billion dollars in uncompensated health care costs, health care leaders warned of service cuts. The City Council took action, passing a measure to secure our fair share of federal funds, and pumping millions into our local economy.

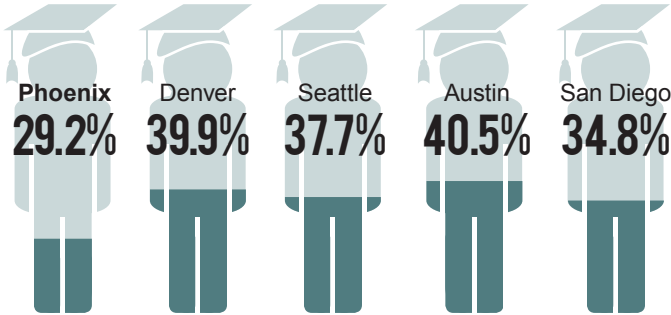

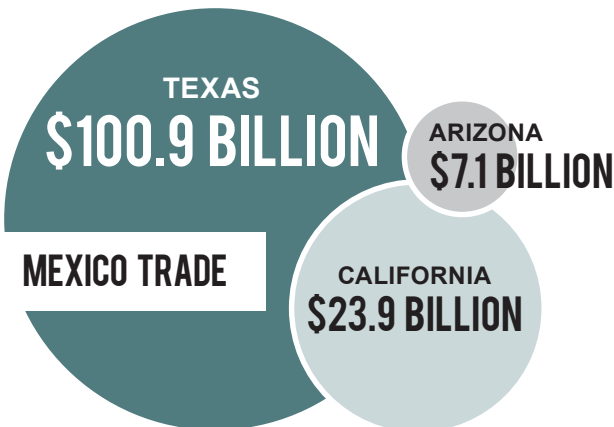
GREATER PHOENIX MUST INCREASE COLLEGE ATTAINMENT RATES

Population 25 and older with a bachelor's degree or higher

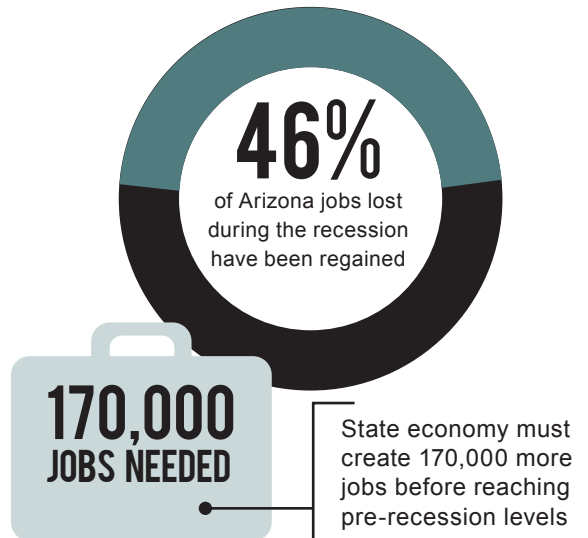


ARIZONA RANKS 48 OF 50 IN THE NATION IN PER-PUPIL SPENDING

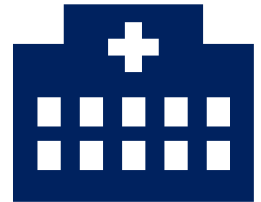
