Jeri Williams is Next Police Chief

On July 13, the Phoenix City Manager named Jeri Williams to be the city's next Police Chief, effective October 2016. Since 2011, Williams has been the Police Chief of Oxnard, California. Before that, Williams spent 22 years rising through the ranks of the Phoenix Police Department. After graduating from Arizona State University, she began her law enforcement career on the streets of Phoenix in 1988. Williams was raised in the Maryvale area in west Phoenix. She has been married for 26 years and has two sons.

"I am excited about returning to Phoenix, the city that has always been my home," said Williams. "I look forward to continuing to build on the trust of the community by ensuring the utmost collaboration and understanding between our residents and the great men and women of the Phoenix Police Department."

Special Election Set for District 3

On Tuesday, November 8, 2016, Phoenix voters residing in Council District 3 will elect a council member to serve the remainder of a term that expires January 2, 2020. This race will appear on the ballot for the November 8 State General Election being conducted by Maricopa County.



District 3 includes the Sunnyslope area.

City voters on the Permanent Early Voting List (PEVL) will automatically receive an early ballot by mail. Voters who are not on the PEVL can request an early ballot, no later than Friday, October 28, by calling **602-506-1511** or online at Recorder.Maricopa.gov/EarlyVotingBallot. Voters will begin receiving early ballots on Wednesday, October 12. Voted early ballots must be received by 7 p.m. on Election Day (Tuesday, November 8).

For voting at the polls, traditional polling places will be used instead of voting centers. On Election Day from 6 a.m. to 7 p.m., voters must cast their ballot only at the specific polling location designated for the precinct where they reside. The name and address of the polling place for each voter's household will be on the sample ballot provided by Maricopa County that will be mailed prior to the election. Free Baby Shots Vaccination Clinics

The Phoenix Fire Department's Baby Shots Program brings vaccines to those who don't have insurance or are underinsured. Each month, several clinics are being offered for those who need it. Parents are asked to bring their children's shot records to the events.



Vaccinations will be given to protect children against 15 serious childhood diseases: Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Diphtheria, Tetanus, Pertussis, Polio, Pneumococcus, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Rotavirus, Meningococcal Disease, Human Papaloma Virus and Varicella. The expanded program will now include adult Measles, Shingles and HPV as well.

Stay Informed, Get Free Tools

Looking to stay connected about neighborhood cleanups, free Neighborhood College workshops, zoning notifications and other community news? The city of Phoenix's Neighborhood Services Department is updating its Neighborhood Notification List, a vital tool used by city departments to communicate with neighborhood organizations about city-sponsored events, grants, public meetings and initiatives.

Organizations listed with the city are also eligible to borrow cleanup tools for free through the department's tools lending program. Existing organizations may update information by emailing nnet.nsd@Phoenix.gov or by calling 602-534-4444. New organizations may download a form at Phoenix.gov/NSD and click on "Neighborhood Notification & Resources."



Tip: Don't Let Water Run Away



Do you experience water runoff on your yard during irrigation? Split your current watering schedule by watering for half the time and then repeat after one hour. If your grass is on a large slope, water for one-third of the scheduled time and then repeat that length of time over the next two hours. Make sure to water after sunset and before sunrise to prevent evaporation.

Be Prepared: Monsoon Video

The 30-minute special program will explain the monsoon and show you how the city of Phoenix is ready to help before, during, and after a storm. 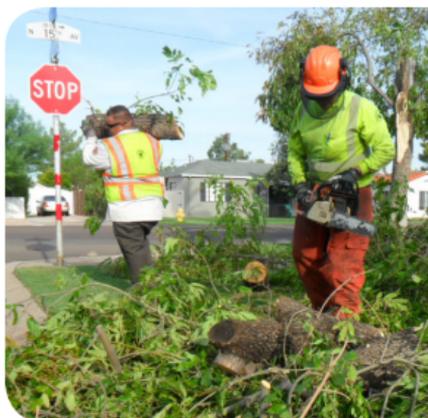
