Head Start recruiting for 2015-16

he Human Services Department is celebrating the 50th anniversary of Head Start and is now recruiting children for the 2015-16 school year.

The center-based Head Start program is looking for children 3 or 4 years old and parents of children with special needs to apply. Head Start offers children from diverse backgrounds active learning activities, nutritious meals and snacks, health screenings, and disabilities- and mental-health services

Families must meet federal income guidelines for family size to be eligible to enroll.

As part of the 50th anniversary, the city is looking for former Head Start students and parents to celebrate their accomplishments and contributions to the community. Since 1965, Head Start has been the premier model for providing children an opportunity for success: More than 31 million children have benefited from its comprehensive services.

Pango app takes the stress out of parking

he city recently launched Pango, a new app that allows drivers to pay for hourly parking by smartphone. There **Mobile Parking** are three ways to access Pango: (1) download the Pango parking app from your smartphone; (2) dial 1-844-Pango44 (1-844-726-4644) from any phone; (3) go to mypango.com.

Pango is free but requires an account to pay remotely. The fee for each Pango transaction is seven cents. Phoenix

everal Phoenix Public Library locations offer Kids Café, which provides free meals to children enrolled in afterschool and summer programs.

St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance provides the healthy meals, which are

accompanied by an educational enrichment program presented by library staff.

Launched in January 2014, Kids Café serves 300 to 350 meals per week. Many children and families have expressed gratitude for both the food and fun provided by the program.

Know before you go: transfer station fees

re you planning to dispose a load of trash at a city transfer station? Here are reminders about disposal fees.

If you are a current Phoenix resident paying monthly refuse/trash fees, you may dispose one load

up to one (1) ton (2,000 pounds) once each calendar month at no charge by complying with the following:

 You must present a copy of your city services (water) bill showing you have an active account paying full service refuse/trash fees that are current and not delinquent.



- You must present a photo I.D. with the name or address matching the city services bill or account. No substitutions permitted.
- To avoid a \$20 unsecured load fee, the load must be properly enclosed, covered or secured from the point of origin to prevent the spilling or blowing of solid waste from the vehicle.
- If your load exceeds one ton, you will be required to leave a deposit and weigh out after dumping.
 The customer must pay the current gate rate of \$38.25/ton for any disposed material in excess of one ton.
- One hour prior to closing, the empty weight (tare) of the vehicle will be estimated at the time of entry. Disposal fees based on the estimated tare fee are final and non-refundable.

ike Eppard with the Water Services Department was working at Tres Rios Wetlands in southwest Phoenix when he noticed a pelican in distress.

The pelican, which is not native to Arizona, was struggling to fly and appeared to be choking on something. Mike grabbed the large bird, placed it on the flatbed of his truck and stuck his fingers down its throat. Sure enough, there was a fish lodged in the pelican's gullet.

It took Mike about 30 minutes to clear the pelican's airway by removing the fish in bits and pieces. Having cheated death, the pelican jumped to the ground and took off – a sight Mike will never forget.

Maryvale Baseball Park to host Household Hazardous Waste event

The next Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) event is from 7 a.m. to noon Friday and Saturday, May 29 and 30, at the Maryvale Baseball Park, 3600 N. 51st Ave.

HHW events are only for city of Phoenix residential solid waste customers. Please bring your current city of Phoenix city services bill showing solid waste fees and a matching photo ID.

Non-hazardous materials brought to events will be sorted and disposed of as municipal solid waste. No commercial loads, large residential quantities, medical waste, explosives or radioactive waste will be accepted. A maximum of five over-the-road-tires per resident will be accepted. No tractor or oversize tires will be allowed.

Mark your calendar for 'I Recycle Phoenix'

The next "I Recycle Phoenix" event will be from 8 a.m. to noon Saturday, May 2, at University of Phoenix Offices, 4025 S. Riverpoint Parkway (University and 32nd Street exit off Interstate 10). At this "recycle-palooza," you can bring old laptops and electronics, phone books and writing utensils, rechargeable batteries, ink jet cartridges, clothing and small appliances. Residents also may shred documents (up to five boxes) and computer hard drives at the event.

Household hazardous waste items, such as tires, oil-based paints and chemicals, will not be accepted. A \$5 fee will be charged for each CRT monitor (bulky computer monitors) and \$10 for each CRT TV (tube).
