

Visit downtown for work or play during Super Bowl Week

Downtown Phoenix will be buzzing with excitement during the week leading up to Super Bowl XLIX, but keep in mind that the area will be open as usual for work and play.

How will you navigate through Super Bowl-related activities and what do you need to know before traveling downtown? For the latest information, visit azsuperbowl.com or phoenix.gov/azsuperbowl, and follow #SBCentral and #SB49 on social media. Valley Metro also will feature commemorative Super Bowl transit passes and enhanced service information on valleymetro.org.

Super Bowl events will span 12 city blocks in downtown Phoenix. Festivities include:

• Super Bowl Central, Jan. 28 - Feb. 1, a free, family-friendly festival featuring football-themed activities, live entertainment and nightly fireworks.



- This 20-foot-tall football will be a focal point of Super Bowl Central in downtown Phoenix
- NFL Experience, Jan. 24 Feb. 1, the world's largest interactive football theme park at the Phoenix Convention Center.

Super Bowl XLIX will be played at the University of Phoenix Stadium on Feb. 1.

Airport shares tips for upcoming busy travel period

Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport will be busy with travelers flying in for Super Bowl XLIX, the Pro Bowl, college bowl games and the Waste Management Phoenix Open Golf Tournament, among other major events.

Here is what you should know if you are flying through Phoenix Sky Harbor:

- Arrive at least two hours before your flight departs. If you are departing Feb. 2, the day after the Super Bowl, arrive at least three hours early.
- Use the 44th Street PHX Sky Train® Station for pick-up and drop-off. There is also a cell phone lot where drivers may wait, free of charge.

- Take advantage of Early Bag Check, a free service for travelers flying American/US Airways, Southwest or United. Travelers may check their bags before they arrive at the terminal and avoid the ticket counter lines. For more information, including hours of operation at each location, visit skyharbor.com/earlybagcheck.
- Visit tsa.gov for information about what can be placed in your carry-on and make sure you do not have prohibited items in your purse or bag.

February is 'Graffiti Free Phoenix' month

The Neighborhood Services Department and the Anti-Graffiti Task Force are promoting February as "Graffiti Free Phoenix" month. Individuals, neighborhood and corporate organizations are encouraged to join the city to help make Phoenix graffiti free.

Here's how you can make a difference:

- Report graffiti in your community by calling 602-534-4444, extension 1, email blight@phoenix.gov (be sure to include the address if you know it) or click on "report it" on phoenix.gov and complete the online blight reporting form.
- Download the free smartphone app (MyPhxAz); use it to report graffiti and other blight violations.
- Volunteer to remove graffiti by hosting a community cleanup.
- Keep your own property free of graffiti.
- Sign up to take a free Neighborhood College workshop and learn how to use a paint sprayer or pressure washer to remove graffiti.

Free paint and supplies will be provided to any group organizing a community cleanup to wipe out graffiti.

community initiative, "Take it, Lock it, Conceal it," or TLC, is designed to reduce the number of vehicle burglaries in Phoenix.

This type of crime can occur anywhere, at any time. Thieves cannot resist purses, electronics, packages, suitcases and boxes left in plain view inside a vehicle. In addition, thieves can take garage-door openers from a car's sun visor or console and use them to commit home burglaries.

Know where to place your solid waste container

When placing your trash, recycling and green organics containers curbside for collection, please make sure that the containers are not interfering with pedestrian or vehicular traffic. Here are other helpful reminders:

- Containers must be placed 15 feet away from a parked vehicle and 4 feet away from a permanent obstruction.
- Sidewalks must have at least 32 inches of clearance for pedestrians. If your containers are impeding the required accessibility, please place the containers' wheels against the curb.
- Containers must be placed 4 feet apart from each other.
- To avoid spillage, do not overfill your containers.

Containers must be removed before 5:30 a.m. the day after collection.
