## Service Disconnections Postponed

As COVID-19 cases continue to rise, the city of Phoenix has decided to postpone a previously announced plan to resume water shut-offs for past due accounts. In March 2020, the city restored water service to all delinguent accounts and deferred water shut-offs due to non-payment for single-family residential customers. The Phoenix City Council has allocated funding for residential utility assistance to support customers. Customers with delinquent accounts should call 602-262-6251 for assistance.

Reminders about bulk trash pick-up:

- Clean area after collection, if needed
- Bag/box all grass, leaves, weeds, twigs, and hedge clippings
- Cut tree trimmings to less than 12" in diameter and 4' in length
- Place broken-down cardboard in your recycle container
- Please do not place more than 20 cubic yards in your pile, which is like the size of a SUV. For other do's and don'ts about bulk trash: Phoenix.gov/PublicWorks/BulkTrash.

### **Stormwater Awareness Week**

The third annual city of Phoenix Stormwater Awareness Week is Jan. 24-30, a regional effort to teach simple everyday actions that can be taken to reduce stormwater pollution. Stormwater in Phoenix is NOT treated like the wastewater leaving your kitchen, laundry appliances, sinks, showers, or toilets. When stormwater runoff comes into contact with chemicals, trash, yard, and pet waste, these pollutants are deposited in nearby rivers, washes, and retention basins.
