It's Good To See You Again

Following guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), fully vaccinated individuals are no longer required to wear masks while inside most city facilities. This includes Phoenix City Hall, Water Pay Stations, senior and recreation centers, city pools and other administrative buildings.

Places where you must still wear a mask, per federal guidelines, include Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport as well as while on city buses. Those who choose to continue to wear a mask may do so.

City Senior Centers Now Open!

All 15 Senior Centers are now open for in-person programming. Due to COVID-19 safety protocols, Senior Centers will remain at reduced capacity with a reservation process in place that offers daily morning and afternoon sessions.

For now, congregate meals will not be offered onsite, but reservations for home delivered frozen meals are available, upon request. Transportation assistance

Pool Season Extended at City Pools!

Cool off with a dip in a city pool.
The Parks and Recreation Department is operating 12 pools this summer.
Reservations are no longer needed for open swim, customers can simply walk up to a facility, and admission is FREE for kids age 17 and younger (kids must be accompanied by someone at least 16 years old for open swim). Open swim will be available in two 2-hour and 45-minute



time blocks daily (noon to 2:45 p.m.; 3 to 5:45 p.m.).

Pool locations include: Cortez, Deer Valley, El Prado, Encanto, Falcon, Maryvale, Paradise Valley, Pecos, Perry, Starlight, Sunnyslope and University. Pools are open six days a week through July (closed Fridays) and on weekends only in August through Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 6.

New for 2021: El Prado, Encanto, Maryvale, Paradise Valley, Starlight and Sunnyslope pools will be open on weekends only throughout the month of September.
