Simple Ways to Avoid Holiday Danger

'Tis the season for holiday fun and potential trouble. Here are some quick tips from the Phoenix Fire Department:

Frying a Turkey: Never leave the fryer unattended, defrost and completely dry your turkey before immersing it in hot oil and keep a fire extinguisher handy.



Christmas Trees: A dried out Christmas tree can be totally consumed by fire in less than 30 seconds.

Most trees sold in the Valley have been cut out of the state and have been drying out since they were harvested. If the tree looks green and fresh, take a long needle and bend it between your thumb and forefinger. If it snaps, the tree is too dry.

Candles: While a traditional part of the holidays, candles are a direct source of fire in your home. A flickering flame is also a thing of fascination to little children. Keep candles out of their reach.

Lights: Use only lights that have been tested for safety. Check each set of lights for broken or cracked sockets, frayed or bare wires or loose connections. Use no more than three sets of lights per single extension.

Stop the Grease for the Holidays



The Environmental Protection Agency says almost half of all sewage overflows are caused by "Fats, Oils and Grease" (FOG). FOG comes from meats, butters and margarine, food scraps, sauces, salad dressings and cooking oil. When FOG goes down the drain it hardens, catches other debris like flushable wipes (not as flushable as you might think)

and causes sewer pipes to clog and potentially send raw sewage into your home. Visit **Phoenix.gov/FOG** for these and other tips to keep FOG out of your home:

- Pour cool grease into a sealed container, then place in the trash.
- Discard food scraps/sauces from plates, pots, and pans into the trash.
- Use sink strainers to collect solids. Do not use the garbage disposal.
