The headliner was a four-member panel of outstanding women (all Phoenix natives, by the way) in the city of Phoenix. They included Solid Waste Supervisor Christy Ortiz, Parks and Rec. Lead User Technology Specialist Shereka Jackson, newly sworn-in Police Chief Jeri Williams and Phoenix Fire Chief Kara Kalkbrenner.

During an often lively exchange of information, guests learned how these outstanding women maneuvered through their professional careers to get to the positions they now hold.

A statement that resonated from each panelist was the importance for women to "stay true to yourselves." The event ended with a networking activity and some closing comments by Communications Director Julie Watters, who shared a small part of her own personal story.
