## **Arrest/Detention**

A court hearing is held within 24 hours of the arrest/detention at which time a judge determines if the person (suspect) may be released. A victim has the right to be heard in person or in writing at this hearing. The type of charge and age of the person charged will determine which court handles the case. Refer to the front cover of the pamphlet for arrest information. Contact the agency below to submit a statement to the court, be notified of release, or for more information.

If within 30 days you are not notified of an arrest in your case, you may call the Phoenix Police Department for the status of the case. See inside cover for telephone numbers.

## Investigation

You will be contacted by police at the earliest opportunity if:

- An arrest is made (if not immediate).
- Property is recovered.
- Additional information is required.
- The status of your case changes.

## Forensic or Medical Exams

Any medical or forensic interview expenses arising out of the need to secure evidence for a dangerous crime against children or a sexual assault shall be paid by the county (Arizona Revised Statue (A.R.S.) § 13-1414).

Adult victims of sexual assault have a right to a medical forensic exam at no cost to them, regardless of whether they make a report to law enforcement. If you receive a medical forensic exam, but you do not make a report to law enforcement, the sexual assault evidence kit will be kept in storage for a limited time. ## Prosecution

<u>Refer to the front cover of the pamphlet for the charging information</u>. The type of charge and age of the person charged will determine which prosecutor's office handles the case. You may contact the prosecutor's office to request or waive your rights, designate a lawful representative, or obtain more information about your rights.

You have the right to be present at all court proceedings. You will be notified prior to a case being declined for prosecution, case dismissal, plea or sentencing negotiations, diversion programs, or any case dispositions. You also have the right to talk to a prosecutor regarding any of these events.

# Victims' Rights

As a victim of a crime, you have a right to be treated with fairness, respect, and dignity and to be free of intimidation, harassment, or abuse throughout the justice process. Arizona Constitution, Article II, § 2.1.

Agencies and courts within the justice system are required to perform certain duties to ensure that you receive your rights. Your legal rights as a victim do not begin until an arrest has been made or charges have been filed.

#### WHO IS A VICTIM?

A victim is the person against whom the crime has been committed and is entitled to victims' rights. Neighborhood associations and legal entities (i.e. businesses) also receive limited victims' rights.

If the victim is killed or incapacitated, individuals related to the victim as listed below may exercise victim rights (unless in custody for the offense or is the suspect):

Spouse Parent Child Sibling Grandparent Other Related by Blood Affinity to the Second Degree Lawful Representative

# **Domestic Violence**

When someone threatens, harasses, molests, stalks, batters, or commits any of the crimes defined in A.R.S. § 13-3601 **AND** one of the relationships below applies, then that person is committing a domestic violence crime. The abuser only needs to threaten, harm, or abuse ONCE for the act to be considered domestic violence.

**Domestic Violence Relationships** 

Spouse/ex-spouse Living together now or in the past. Persons with a child in common or pregnant Blood-related or related by marriage Have/had a romantic or sexual relationship Court-ordered as a parent, grandparent, child, grandchild, brother, or sister

If there is a firearm present when there has been a domestic violence incident and police believe that there is heightened risk, the firearm may be held for as little as 72 hours or up to 6 months. The owner of the firearm has a right to a hearing to determine when it will be returned. For notification about hearings, call the prosecutor's office (see Prosecution section). See the middle of this pamphlet for firearm seizure receipt if applicable.

# **Protective Orders**

Protective orders can be requested with or without a lawyer. The order may also cover other designated persons, as necessary. Addresses may be kept confidential.

### **Orders of Protection**

An Order of Protection can prohibit a domestic violence abuser from:

- · Committing further offenses or having any contact with the person(s) listed;
- Going to a residence, workplace, school, or other locations; and
- Possessing or purchasing a firearm.

The order may also include other relief necessary for your protection.

If you or the abuser has filed for legal separation or dissolution of marriage, you must obtain an Order of Protection from the Maricopa County Superior Court, located at 201 West Jefferson Street.

#### \*\*ORDERS OF PROTECTION ARE NOT VALID UNTIL PROPERLY SERVED\*\*

There is no filing or service process fee through the court; however, private process servers do have a fee.

An Emergency Order of Protection is available during nights and weekends through the Phoenix Police Department. Emergency orders expire at the end of the next business day, so you will need to obtain a regular Order of Protection from the court before the emergency order expires.

### Injunctions Against Harassment/Workplace Injunction

If your case does not involve domestic violence, but you want protection, you can request an Injunction Against Harassment, which orders a person to stop harassment, and may include terms described above for orders of protection. Harassment is defined as a series of acts that occur over any period and are directed at a specific person.

# **Victim Compensation**

The Victim Compensation Program provides emergency financial assistance to crime victims for specified out-of-pocket expenses related to a crime. These include, but are not limited to, medical expenses, funeral costs, lost wages, and mental health counseling.

You may be eligible for the Victim Compensation Program if:

- The crime was reported within 72 hours of discovery.
- The claim is filed within two years of discovery.
- You willingly cooperate with appropriate law enforcement agencies.
- The crime directly resulted in physical injury, extreme mental distress, or death.
- The eligible loss was incurred as a direct result of the crime.
- You are NOT serving a sentence of imprisonment in any detention facility.

# Restitution

If criminal charges are filed and if the defendant is **convicted**, you may be eligible for repayment for expenses you incurred as a direct result the crime. Restitution may include:

- Lost wages
- Property damage
- Mental health counseling
- Other uninsured expenses
  - \*\* Restitution does NOT include "pain and suffering." \*\*

A judge will determine whether restitution is to be paid and, if so, how much. If the defendant is a juvenile, you may file for restitution from the parents of the juvenile. You also have the right to file a pre-conviction restitution lien. Contact the prosecutor's office for more information about restitution.

### NOTIFICATION OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE FIREARM SEIZURE

Arizona Revised Statue (A.R.S.) § 13-3601(C), authorizes a peace officer to temporarily seize a firearm if the officer believes that the firearm would expose the victim or another person in the household to a risk of serious bodily injury or death.

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 13-3601(D), "Each seized firearm shall be held for at least seventy-two hours by the law enforcement agency that seized the firearm."

Pursuant to A.R.S. § 13-3601(E), "If a firearm is seized pursuant to subsection C, the victim shall be notified by a peace officer before the firearm is released from temporary custody."

Therefore, please consider this your notification that firearm(s) temporarily seized by the Phoenix Police Department during a domestic violence incident, report number will be held at least 72 hours from today's date before being returned to the owner.

The owner/possessor of the firearm has a right to a hearing to determine when the firearm will be returned. If a hearing is requested and you would like to appear, call the Family Investigations Bureau at (602) 534-2121 and ask to speak with the detective assigned to your case.

If there are any changes in circumstances that you believe the Phoenix Police Department should be aware of, please call the Family Investigations Bureau at (602) 534-2121 and advise your assigned detective of these changes.
