Arbor Day: Recap

Arbor Day is a celebration of trees and the amazing role that they play in our environment. But what's all the fuss? Why are trees so important? Here's just a few reasons:

Trees help clean our air by removing fossil fuel emissions and other pollutants, improving air quality and human health.

One large tree can provide a day's supply of oxygen for up to four people.

Trees lower surface and air temperatures by providing shade. Shaded surfaces may be 20-45°F cooler than the peak temperatures of unshaded materials.
