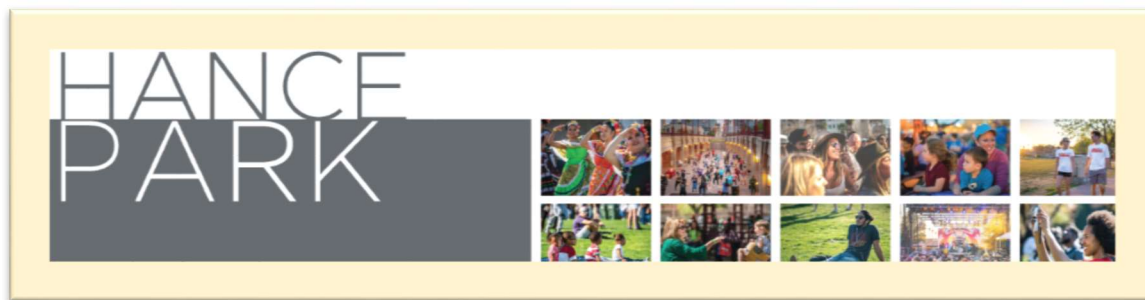

## ID REQUIREMENTS ARE CHANGING: REAL ID



Beginning October 1, 2020, every air traveler 18 years of age and older will need a **REAL ID** compliant driver's license (or another acceptable form of identification) in order to fly.

Arizona is compliant with the REAL ID Act. Federal agencies can accept driver's licenses and identification cards from **Arizona** at Federal facilities and nuclear power plants.

Secure driver's licenses and identification documents are a vital component of a holistic national security strategy. Law enforcement must be able to rely on government-issued identification documents and know that the bearer of such a document is who he or she claims to be. REAL ID is a coordinated effort by the states and the Federal Government to improve the reliability and accuracy of state-issued identification documents, which should inhibit terrorists' ability to evade detection by using fraudulent identification.

## CENSUS 2020: ICOUNT ON APRIL 1, 2020



### What is the U.S. Census? Courtesy

Every 10 years, the United States counts every person living in the country to determine the number of seats each state has in the U.S. House of Representatives (a process called apportionment) and also to distribute billions of dollars in federal funds to local communities.

### About the Count:

You and each person living in your household count toward providing hot school lunches for children, medicine for older adults, safer roads for your neighborhood and many more vital services for everyone in your community.

That's because every 10 years, the United States counts how many people are living here and uses the data to divide up \$675 billion in federal funds to support programs in education, healthcare, transportation, park and recreation services and other important local resources.

Getting counted in the census is your opportunity to help your community receive funding for public programs and services. Also, as more people are counted, the more representation your community has in Congress. If the census accurately reflects Arizona's population growth, our state is expected to gain a seat in the House of Representatives.

The census also gives businesses an idea of who's living where, so they know where to open new stores or offer services in communities that were previously underserved.

### What the Census means to me:

Census data helps with the allocation of federal funding across 55 programs, including the National School Lunch Program, federal student loan programs, and many more.

For every person counted, from infants to young children to older adults, the State of Arizona receives \$2,959 from the federal government. This amount adds up to more than \$20 billion annually for Arizona. The more people counted, the more money each community stands to receive.

The United States has counted its population every 10 years since the first census in 1790.

The 2020 Census will be the first year you can fill out your census online. The census website is safe, secure and confidential.



### 55 PROGRAMS

### \$2,959 EACH

For every person counted, from infants to young children to older adults, the State of Arizona receives \$2,959 from the federal government. This amount adds up to more than \$20 billion annually for Arizona. The more people counted, the more money each community stands to receive.

### Your Right to Privacy: How the Census Protects You

Completing the census is your opportunity to count toward local resources and representation. Answers are only reported in statistical data, which helps guide funding for community services such as maintaining public spaces, keeping libraries open, road improvements and supporting art and cultural programs.

The U.S. Census Bureau understands the need to protect everyone's right to privacy and keeps answers completely confidential. Responses cannot be shared with any other person, organization, court, business or government agency for any reason.

U.S. Census Bureau staff members are committed to keeping your answers safe and making sure everyone feels comfortable answering the survey. That's why they take a lifetime oath to maintain your privacy and never reveal information about your identity.

Under Title 13 of the U.S. Code, staff members face up to five years in prison and/or a \$250,000 fine for violating that oath. ### **CITY MANAGER’S REPORT:**

#### **Legislative**

Water Services was awarded \$200,000 from the U.S. Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation under the WaterSMART Water Marketing Strategy grant program. The City of Phoenix Water Department will partner with the City of Tucson and American Rivers to develop the Central Arizona Water Clearinghouse to facilitate future water market transactions and maximize use of infrastructure and storage capacity to manage water shortages.

#### **Economic Development & Education**

On Dec. 9 and 10, Aviation Staff met with personnel from Lufthansa/Eurowings to meet key airport on-boarding personnel from Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and Transportation Security Administration (TSA), partake in an airside airport tour, view leasable space and engage with prospective airline-service providers. Eurowings will start non-stop service from Phoenix to Frankfurt in April 2020.

Last month, Library staff hosted 46 children to practice reading skills with a reading therapy dog at Desert Broom, Ironwood, Mesquite and Burton Barr Central Libraries.

Last month, Library staff hosted seven adults for a “Business Roadmap” workshop at Cesar Chavez Library. The Business Roadmap Program is a month-long series of eight start-up workshops detailing business essentials.

On Jan 5, Library staff will host a live performance by local valley artist Megyn Neff at Burton Barr Central Library on the 5th floor Reading Room.

Last week, Library staff hosted 313 individuals through several College Depot events and programs. Staff served 144 teens and adults and assisted 23 individuals with one-on-one college planning and re-engagement appointments at Burton Barr Central Library.

## **Neighborhoods and Livability**

On Dec. 12, Neighborhood Services staff attended the Love Your Block project kick-off in the St. John community located at 28th Street and Bell Road. St. John Alliance Block Watch and Vista Verde Middle School partnered to design a community mural that conveys a message of being a superhero, demonstrating kindness, freedom, positive actions, and togetherness. Student artists designed the concept and will participate in the painting along with residents. A member of the St. John Alliance Block Watch is producing a documentary of the project from its initial stage to completion. The next painting date is Jan. 9, 2020.

On Dec. 14, Neighborhood Services staff assisted with the coordination of the 25th Annual Kid Street Holiday event at the Marc Atkinson Center. The holiday event included music, a visit from Santa, games, food and a bike rodeo. Approximately 1,000 residents were in attendance.

On Dec. 10, Parks and Recreation staff worked for four hours on the National Trail at South Mountain Park to install a new directional post and clean the trail to ensure users follow the designated alignment.

Last month, Parks and Recreation staff planted 83 box trees at Hermoso Park as part of the Sikh community tree planting.

During the months of September through November, 866 people participated in Parks and Recreation staff's Fall into Parks program at Margaret T. Hance and Townsend parks. Approximately 100 people participate in the program weekly. Fall into Parks provides the community with organized recreation programming for all ages, including fun activities like, soccer, flag football, pickleball and kickball, with an emphasis on school aged children.

## **Social Services Delivery**

On Dec. 11, Human Services staff hosted the 2019 Volunteer Recognition Event at the Phoenix Convention Center. Members from the 15 Senior Centers were recognized for contributing over 100,000+ volunteer hours equal to \$2,552,383.67.

On December 10, Human Services staff met with the Department of Economic Security, (DES) Family Assistance Administration to discuss a pilot project to provide DES clients who are receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families and/or Supplemental Nutrition Assistance program funds with utility assistance. The first phase of the pilot is tentatively scheduled to begin on Jan. 13, 2020 and will run for three months.

This week, Housing staff hosted a Cards for the Troops community event at Aeroterra Community Center. More than 1,000 cards were created by over 125 residents and community members then sent to military members overseas.

## **Infrastructure**

This week, Public Transit staff facilitated a Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) workshop with several city departments, Valley Metro, MAG, ADOT and all four program consultant teams. The purpose of the workshop was to



analyze the preliminary BRT corridors based on the results of the initial transit technical analysis and provide recommendations for potential BRT corridors. The workshop included an overview of BRT as well as detailed information on the transit performance analysis and ridership forecasting conducted thus far.

To date, Street Transportation staff have completed 45 ADA ramps between McDowell and Camelback Roads.

Last week, Street Transportation staff continued work on the Third Avenue modification between Coolidge and Mariposa Streets. This street modification project consists of installation of sidewalk and ADA ramps along the east side of 3rd Avenue. Staff also planted trees on the southeast corner of 3rd Avenue and Pierson Street.

Last week, Information Technology Services and Aviation staff completed setting up the boarding sequence display application for Delta and Jet Blue in Terminal 3. This new application will allow airlines to display boarding sequence on the overhead display monitors at the Terminal 3 boarding gates and make boarding process less stressful. The rollout of this application also addresses airlines' requirement to be able to display real time status of their boarding process to passengers.
