2019 Street Paving Season Wrap Up

Phoenix’s 2019 street paving season went on record as the biggest ever to be accomplished featuring more than 250 miles of newly paved streets. Due largely to the Council-approved \$200 million financing of [Transportation 2050](#) street program revenues, the city tripled the number of arterial and major street miles that were paved this year.

Upcoming Pavement Maintenance

Currently, the January schedule includes only two projects for crack seal in preparation for pavement maintenance for Council District 1. Colder weather is not conducive to paving because lower temperatures and winter conditions affect the quality and long-term performance of the pavement. Crews will now be focused on preparation work for the 2020 paving season – addressing curbs and gutters, repairing sidewalks, sealing cracks in the asphalt and retrofitting sidewalks with wheelchair accessible ramps. *Note: Planned street repair locations and work schedules are subject to change.*

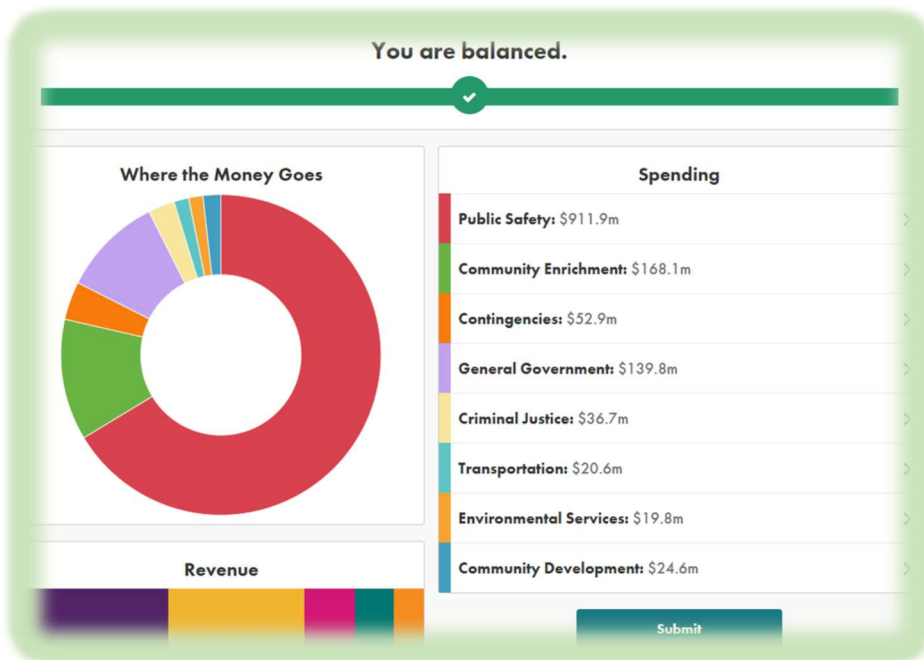
FUNDPHX LETS YOU LEARN ABOUT THE DOLLARS AND SENSE IN PHOENIX'S BUDGET



Are you interested in diving into the dollars and sense behind what makes the city of Phoenix run? Now you can learn more about all the programs and services the city provides, and what it costs to bring them to you every day.

That's possible through a new tool, called FundPHX, that takes the city's \$1.4 billion General Fund operating budget and brings it directly to your device – computer, smart phone or tablet. All the city's programs are there, with costs and descriptions, so you can learn about what it takes to provide everything from youth recreation activities to reading programs and senior services in your neighborhood.

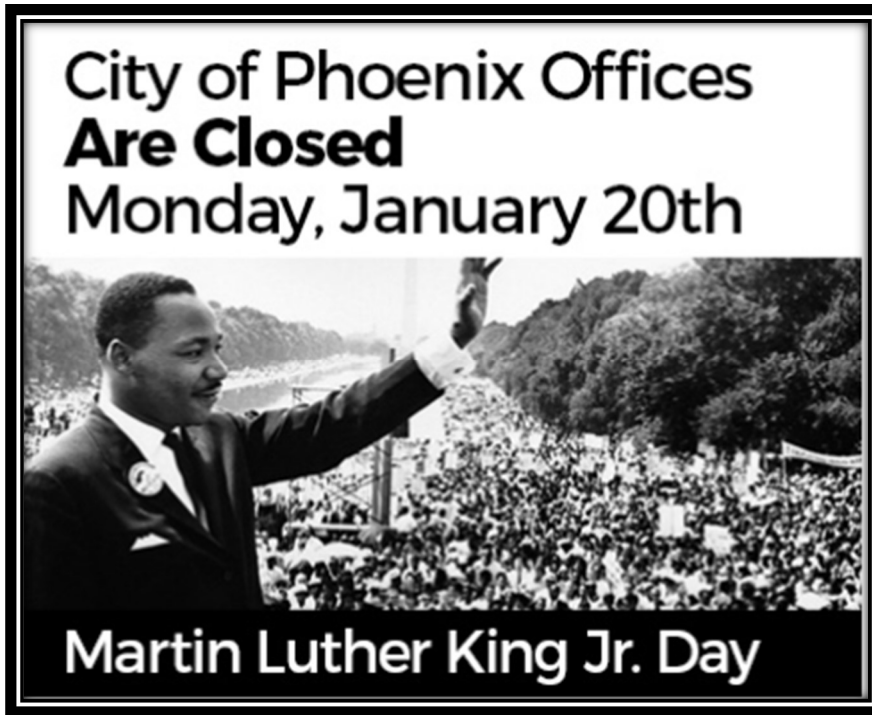
With FundPHX you can provide comments directly on the budget, and let the city know what you think is important. PHOENIX COMPLETES LED STREET LIGHT CONVERSION, ESTIMATING \$3.5 MILLION IN ENERGY SAVINGS PER YEAR

Phoenix residents are experiencing improved visibility on city streets after the conversion to LED street lights. The city of Phoenix completed a citywide conversion of nearly 100,000 standard street lights to energy-efficient light-emitting diode (LED) units. This conversion is one of the largest completed by any U.S. city.

The conversion was approved by Phoenix City Council after several years of testing and evaluation of various LED street lights. Based upon community input and the evaluations, Phoenix adopted 2,700 kelvin as the standard kelvin level for Phoenix's new LED street lights, which is considered a warmer color temperature for LED lights.

The new LED street lights are anticipated to save the city approximately \$3.5 million in annual energy costs. By switching to more energy efficient LED fixtures, the city reduced the amount of electricity needed to illuminate the streets by approximately 53%. This reduction prevents emissions of up to 18,000 metric tons of carbon dioxide a year -- the equivalent of taking 3,800 cars off the road.

LED street lights also have longer lifespans and produce better light quality than the previously used high pressure sodium street lights. In addition to substantial energy savings, the LED fixtures will reduce maintenance expenses over their service life. Each of the nearly 100,000 new fixtures come with a ten-year warranty.

LED technology can also improve roadway visibility and safety due to the improved distribution of light compared to high pressure sodium street lights. Improved visibility has been linked to a reduction in crime and increased pedestrian safety.

NEIGHBORHOOD NOTIFICATION: TRAFFIC LANE STRIPING IMPROVEMENTS 19TH AVE. FROM UNION HILLS TO BEARDSLEY RD.

As part of the Street Transportation Department's core mission, we strive to improve the City's roadways to create a safe and efficient transportation network.

Our ongoing pavement maintenance program provides opportunities to change the existing traffic lane striping and add new bike lanes on some streets to improve safety for people who walk, drive, ride bicycles and use transit.

19th Ave. from Union Hills Dr. to Beardsley Rd. is scheduled for pavement maintenance (new asphalt) in spring/summer 2020 and will be ready for traffic lane striping improvements. These improvements will include the slight narrowing of vehicle travel lanes to accommodate the addition of a bicycle lane. The slight narrowing of the lane widths to accommodate the buffers will help to guide and slow traffic. Parking restrictions and the number of travel lanes will remain the same. The proposed future traffic lane striping is depicted below, looking northbound:



Pavement maintenance work is scheduled to begin in spring/summer 2020 but is subject to change. Before the pavement work begins, we will notify the properties located directly next to the roadway where the work will be taking place.

Traffic lane striping will begin shortly after the pavement work is complete.

LANE RESTRICTIONS CONTINUE I-17 IN NORTH PHOENIX NEXT WEEK; PLAN FOR FULL FREEWAY CLOSURE LATER THIS MONTH

The Arizona Department of Transportation advises drivers who use Interstate 17 in north Phoenix to plan for overnight lane restrictions next week and full closures of I-17 and Pinnacle Peak Road from Jan. 24 to Jan. 26. Crews are scheduled to set the girders on the second new Pinnacle Peak Road bridge as the interchange reconstruction project continues



Motorists should slow down and be prepared to merge into open travel lanes while the following restrictions are in place:

- Northbound I-17 will be narrowed to one lane at Rose Garden Lane from 10 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 19, to 12:01 a.m. Monday, Jan. 20.
- Northbound I-17 will be narrowed to one lane at Happy Valley Road from 11:30 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 19, to 5 a.m. Monday, Jan. 20, **and** from 10 p.m. Monday to 5 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 21. **Also:** Southbound I-17 will be narrowed to two lanes in the same location at the same time.
- Southbound I-17 will be narrowed to one lane and northbound I-17 will be narrowed to two lanes at Happy Valley Road from 10 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 21, to 5 a.m. Wednesday, Jan. 22.
- Southbound I-17 will be narrowed to one lane at Happy Valley Road from 10 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 22, to 5 a.m. Thursday, Jan. 23.
- Pinnacle Peak Road will be reduced to **one lane only** at the I-17 bridge, and flaggers will alternate drivers through the open lane, from 11 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 22, to 4 a.m. Thursday, Jan. 23 **and** from 11 p.m. Thursday to 4 a.m. Friday, Jan. 24. Drivers should slow down and use caution around construction personnel and equipment in the work zone.
- Southbound I-17 will be narrowed to one lane, and northbound I-17 will be narrowed to two lanes at Happy Valley Road, from 10 p.m. Thursday, Jan. 23, to 5 a.m. Friday, Jan. 24.

I-17 AND PINNACLE PEAK ROAD CLOSURES

- Southbound I-17 will be closed at Pinnacle Peak Road from 10 p.m. Friday, Jan. 24, to 7 a.m. Saturday, Jan. 25. The ramps at I-17 will remain open. Drivers can use the off- and on-ramps to exit and reenter the highway or use southbound 19th Avenue between Jomax and Deer Valley roads as an alternate. **Also: East and westbound Pinnacle Peak Road will be closed at I-17** while crews place girders for the second new bridge. Drivers can use Deer Valley or Happy Valley roads as detours.
- Northbound I-17 will be closed at Pinnacle Peak Road from 10 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 25, to 9 a.m. Sunday, Jan. 26. The ramps at I-17 will remain open. Drivers can use the off- and on-ramps to exit and reenter the highway or use northbound 19th Avenue between Deer Valley and Jomax roads as an alternate. **Also: East and westbound Pinnacle Peak Road will be closed at I-17** while crews place girders for the second new bridge. Drivers can use Deer Valley or Happy Valley roads as detours.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

Economic Development & Education

The Phoenix Human Relations Commission is inviting residents to participate in a free, Regional Unity Walk to promote mutual respect and understanding. Communications and Equal Opportunity staff are assisting to promote the event. On Jan. 25, the free festival at Tempe Beach Park will start at 4:30 p.m. and the one-mile walk over the Mill Avenue bridge will begin at 6 p.m.

This week, College Depot staff served 326 teens and adults and assisted 159 individuals with one-on-one college planning and re-engagement appointments at Burton Barr Central Library. College Depot recently celebrated its 139th student graduate from Career Online High School and currently has 71 students enrolled.

In the last three weeks, Library staff hosted 62 children, ages 3-5 years old, and their caregivers to stories, games and activities designed to nourish the skills that lead to success in school through the Tools for School program.

Neighborhoods and Livability

On Jan. 6, the Landlord and Tenant (L/T) program transitioned to the Travis L. Williams Family Resource Center to better serve our community. To ensure consistent and seamless service, one L/T staff will remain at City Hall until the end of January.

Planning and Development staff currently are working with an applicant to convert the building at 818 E. Osborn into a firefighter video training facility utilizing Adaptive Reuse Incentive funds.

Planning and Development staff held a pre-application meeting for a gated 25-lot, single-family detached subdivision at 8201 S. 9th St. within the Baseline Area Overlay District (BAOD). The proposed subdivision is bordered by the Highline Canal, and will be required to provide pedestrian access, view fencing and landscaped setbacks unless variances are sought. The applicant proposes to build a bridge over the canal at the 9th Street alignment to provide improved access to Baseline Road.

Planning and Development staff also conducted a pre-application meeting for a 207-unit multifamily development east of the 59th Avenue alignment and south of Southern Avenue. The project will include centralized open space amenities and shaded walkways between units and consist of single family and duplex style rentals.

On Jan. 6, the final punch walk-through of Phoenix Art Museum's dry pipe sprinkler system retrofit occurred. The project involved replacement of risers and dry pipe in all the galleries, with exception of the American/European Gallery, and in the art vaults, and replacing the oxygen pumps on the system with nitrogen pumps.

Social Services Delivery

This week, the Monroe Gardens Affordable Housing project groundbreaking ceremony took place. Monroe Gardens will be a 78-unit affordable housing community that replaces the 38 aging A.L. Krohn East public

housing apartments at 1441 E. Monroe St. Construction is scheduled to be completed by Dec. 31, 2020 and former residents of A.L. Krohn East will be provided the first right to return to the new development.

Eleven families and 32 pets from the Edison-Eastlake Community recently took part in the free spay and neuter pet clinic at the Aeroterra Community Center. Residents made appointments to have their cats and dogs fixed and vaccinated at the clinic and received educational materials for basic pet care and information on holiday hazards for pets.

Infrastructure

Bicycle lanes were recently installed on Roosevelt Street between 7th Avenue and Central Avenue using temporary traffic tape. This 30-day trial is the City’s first street demonstration project where temporary infrastructure is installed to help the community understand how a proposed design could function.

At the Dec. 17, Maricopa Association of Governments (MAG) Active Transportation Committee (ATC) meeting, the City was awarded \$5.2 million in Federal Transportation Alternatives Projects funding for three separate projects: 20th Street Bicycle Corridor Improvements - Grand Canal to Highland Avenue (\$2.3M); Phoenix Citywide Pedestrian Safety HAWKs (\$1.3M); and 56th Street Pedestrian and Bicycle Improvements - Thomas Road to Indian School Road, Phase 2 (\$1.6M).

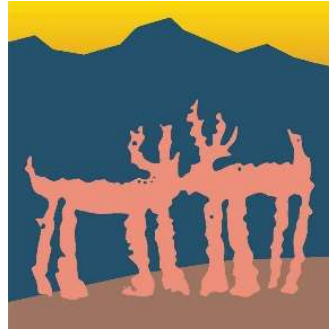
