PHOENIX DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

The City of Phoenix Family Advocacy Center, the Phoenix Police Department and the Arizona Coalition to End Sexual and Domestic Violence are teaming up to spread a message of hope and help for those facing dangerous situations at home during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Domestic Violence Help! is a community initiative launching today designed to share hotline and website information so victims of domestic abuse can move forward as survivors. Police has invited local radio stations, TV stations and billboard companies to join with us in spreading this important public service message. The Phoenix Newsroom will have sharable stories of survivors along with expert advice for people who need help or know someone who needs help.

Why this message right now in the middle of a world-wide pandemic? Domestic violence calls are on the rise. In the month of March, calls for service were up more than 5% year-over-year. The first two weeks of April, that number jumped to 15%.

While the causes of domestic violence are as varied as the individuals involved, we know the following risk factors are increasing due to COVID19:

- Stay at home orders and social isolation could put potential abusers closer to their victims
- Victims may not have access to the same network of support systems through family and friends
- Economic fears could add increased stress on both the abuser and their potential victim.
- Domestic abuse is about power and control. Abuser may use COVID19 fears to exercise control over their victims
- Victims may worry that shelters or other resources aren't available because of COVID closures—that's not true. Help is available whenever you need it.

PUBLIC WORKS DIGITAL RECYCLING EDUCATION

Recycle+

On the 50th anniversary of Earth Day, April 22, the Phoenix Public Works Department launched their digital education webpage, <https://www.phoenix.gov/publicworks/recycleplus> focused on teaching school-aged children and adults about recycling and waste diversion.

The webpage was developed by the department's Zero Waste team, dedicated to delivering recycling education and community outreach to Phoenix residents.

"Public Works values community engagement even with the current social distancing guidelines," said Ginger Spencer, Public Works director. "Recycle+ is one way we are adapting to the new norms to keep connecting with Phoenix residents and continue our recycling education strategy to achieve a 40% waste diversion rate by the end of 2020."

Recycle+ features resources, activities and even contests about recycling and sustainability that typically would be presented during a traditional in-person presentation. It also includes the Recycle Right Wizard, a desktop app that takes the guesswork out of recycling by indicating whether a certain material is recyclable or not. A video tour of the city's recycling center or Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) can also be accessed from that page to temporarily replace the usual free in-person tours.

With the rest of the school year suspended, the Recycle+ webpage can be a supplement to children's homeschooling activities or may provide 15 minutes of free time for parents. The Zero Waste team will continue to add new content to the page, including webinar presentations, informational videos and recycling or composting quizzes.

Educational outreach is one of the three pillars of Phoenix's Reimagine Phoenix initiative to increase recycling and reach a 40% waste diversion rate by the end of 2020, and become a zero-waste city by the year 2050. As of July 2019, Phoenix's waste diversion rate is at 36%, which is above the national average (34%).

CENSUS 2020: HAVE YOU BEEN COUNTED?



The importance of completing the Census now is incredibly key to supporting our community now and in the future. Participating in the Census assists the city in obtaining funding that provides vital resources, programs and services such as housing, transportation, education, public safety, and so much more for the city of Phoenix, and can be easily done just by filling out the online Census form.

You should have already received a code in the mail that you can use to complete the Census form for your household online at <https://my2020census.gov/>. You'll be asked basic demographic questions about your household, including how many people are living in the home; if your home is owned or rented, and about the age, sex, race, and relationships of the people who are in the household.

“Participation in the Census is critical for Phoenix, because it impacts our funding across so many areas for years to come,” said Albert Santana, the city’s Census Director. “The form only takes ten minutes to complete, so it is one of the simplest ways to ensure that we have the resources we need to operate.”



In Phoenix, an accurate 2020 Census count represents \$533 per person, or approximately \$866 million a year. The campaign highlights the ways that an accurate count in the census supports local governments, and provides information on how to respond to the census online, by phone or by mail; what residents should look for when receiving communication from the federal government about the Census; and a variety of Frequently-Asked-Questions.

Hunger is one of the greatest threats to our community and we can help more people when we work together. Every year during National Library Week, Phoenix Public Library has sponsored a food drive in partnership with St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance. A partnership between Phoenix Public Library and St. Mary's Foodbank Alliance is a natural alliance as we both have a vested interest in no member of our community going to bed hungry.

Even with Phoenix Public Library’s temporary closure, in which we are unable to accept food donations at our libraries, we want to continue to honor our “National Library Week” tradition and support St. Mary’s Food Bank Alliance and those that rely upon them for their meals. So we are trying something different with our Fill the Shelves “virtual” food drive this year and asking our library supporters to help St. Mary’s Foodbank Alliance by making an online donation as part of our observance of National Library Week, April 19-25, 2020.

ADOT: EXPECT LANE AND RAMP CLOSURES AT INTERSTATE 17 IN NORTH PHOENIX FOR INTERCHANGE RECONSTRUCTION



Full closure of I-17 at Happy Valley Road scheduled for May 1-2

Interchange reconstruction continues at Interstate 17 and Pinnacle Peak and Happy Valley roads in north Phoenix. The Arizona Department of Transportation advises drivers to slow down and use caution around construction personnel and equipment while the following restrictions are in place:

- The southbound I-17 Pinnacle Peak Road off- and on-ramps will be closed from 9 p.m. Sunday, April 26, to 5 a.m. Monday, April 27. The frontage road will remain open. Drivers can use the on- and off-ramps at Happy Valley or Deer Valley roads to enter and exit I-17.
- The northbound I-17 Pinnacle Peak Road off- and on-ramps will be closed from 9 p.m. Monday, April 27, to 5 a.m. Tuesday, April 28. The frontage road will remain open. Drivers can use the on- and off-ramps at Happy Valley or Deer Valley roads to enter and exit I-17.
- North and southbound I-17 will be narrowed to one or two lanes at Pinnacle Peak Road nightly from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. beginning Monday, April 27, and continuing through the morning of Friday, May 1.
- The northbound I-17 Pinnacle Peak Road off-ramp will be closed from 9 p.m. Wednesday, April 29, to 5 a.m. Thursday, April 30. The frontage road will remain open. Drivers can exit I-17 at Deer Valley Road and use 19th Avenue north to Pinnacle Peak Road.
- The southbound I-17 Pinnacle Peak Road on-ramp will be closed from 9 p.m. Thursday, April 30, to 5 a.m. Friday, May 1. Drivers can use 35th or 19th avenues south to Deer Valley Road to access I-17.

Upcoming full closure of I-17:

- I-17 will be closed in both directions at Happy Valley Road from 9 p.m. Friday, May 1, to 7 a.m. Saturday, May 2. East and westbound Happy Valley Road at I-17 will remain open.
 - **Southbound detour:** Drivers will detour along the off- and on-ramps at Happy Valley Road. Drivers can also exit ahead of the closure at Jomax Road and use southbound 19th Avenue between Jomax and Deer Valley roads.

Northbound detour: Drivers will detour along the off- and on-ramps at Happy Valley Road. Drivers can also exit ahead of the closure at Deer Valley Road and use northbound 19th Avenue between Deer Valley and Jomax roads.

Crews are on schedule to open the new tight diamond interchange at I-17 and Pinnacle Peak Road later this spring. See the rendering of what the new interchange will look like. The project is scheduled for completion this fall.

Zoom virtual backgrounds feature heavy equipment, big bridges and more. A Keep It Grand Adopt a Highway art challenge has encouraged kids to create and share messages about the value of clean highways.

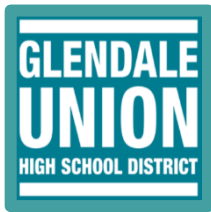
