Returning Voted Early Ballots

Early ballots have been mailed to voters on the Permanent Early Voting List and to residents who requested them in advance for the Nov. 3, 2020 Election. Voters who complete their ballots are encouraged to return the ballot as soon as it is voted. Returning voted ballots as early as possible provides more time for signature verification and processing so that final results are available sooner.



Early ballots must be received by Maricopa County Elections Department no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day, Nov. 3, 2020. Voters who place their voted ballot in the mail should allow for delivery time for the ballot to arrive by the deadline.

It is recommended that voters mail their ballots at least 6 days before Election Day – by Oct. 27. Please note that a mailed ballot with a postmark of Nov. 3 or earlier will not be counted if it is received after 7 p.m. on Election Day.

Another option for voters is to drop off their voted early ballot at any designated drop box or polling location in Maricopa County. Now Open: Phoenix funds RISE Microbusiness Grant

Small, neighborhood businesses are the backbone of our community, but they have been hit hard by COVID-19. The city of Phoenix is mobilizing \$2 million of federal funds to be distributed to some of the hardest hit of the small neighborhood businesses. The newly announced funds for the Phoenix RISE Microbusiness Grant are reserved for business owners in low-and moderate-income households. Eligible businesses can receive up to \$10,000 to help keep them operating during this difficult time.

Nationally, nearly 13 million or approximately half of all microbusiness owners earn less than \$50,000 annually and are considered low-and-moderate-income households, according to the Prosperity Now Washington-DC non-profit group.

The city of Phoenix has contracted with LISC Phoenix to administer the fund and application process. Owners of businesses that have up to five employees and where the business owner's household falls below regional income standards. City of Phoenix Seeks Input to Fight Climate Change

The city of Phoenix is seeking community and stakeholder input on its draft Climate Action Plan (CAP) framework. The proposed plan will address the challenges posed by climate change and help make Phoenix the most sustainable desert city on the planet.

Phoenix's membership in the C40 network of cities requires the city to develop a CAP. The draft CAP framework includes goals and specific actions for reducing greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions from various activities categorized in three areas: Stationary Energy, Transportation and Waste. It also includes Phoenix-specific topics, such as Air Quality, Food Systems, Heat, and Water.

This opportunity to develop a plan comes after Phoenix just experienced the hottest summer on record, a drier than normal monsoon season and smoke-filled skies from wildfires within Arizona and all along the West Coast. Events like these are predicted to increase in frequency over the coming decades.

To help fight climate change, the city would like to hear the community's thoughts on how to enhance the environment. There are a variety of opportunities for residents to get involved: review the draft plan framework, participate in virtual workshops, and submit feedback, comments or questions at phoenix.gov/oepp/cap. Public comment is due on Dec. 31.

STREET TRANSPORTATION

Scan the Street for Wheels and Feet



The city of Phoenix Street Transportation Department is launching a new public service announcement (PSA) – Scan the Street for Wheels and Feet. The animated PSA reminds people to be alert and on the lookout for the wide variety of people who use Phoenix streets but may not be driving a car. People walking, running, using wheelchairs or other mobility devices, riding bicycles, pushing strollers or riding scooters are sharing our streets, so be sure to Scan the Street for Wheels and Feet.

“Scan the Streets for Wheels and Feet is part of the Street Transportation Department's [Heads Up!](#) pedestrian safety campaign,” Street Transportation Director Kini Knudson said. “We are working to improve safety through engineering with the implementation of HAWK signals, flashing pedestrian beacons and high visibility crosswalks, but we also want to influence behavior by educating the public through these PSAs.” Watch and share the animated public service announcement here: <https://youtu.be/IhltzXheEsI>.

The Show Goes on for 5th Annual Noche en Blanco

Margaret T. Hance Park's fall fundraiser set for 5-9 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 24



The Hance Park Conservancy, a community-based organization charged with promoting and advocating for Margaret T. Hance Park (Hance Park), and its board of trustees have announced that the fifth edition of the annual signature fundraising event Noche en Blanco will proceed on the evening of Saturday, Oct. 24, 2020, from 5 to 9 p.m.

Fashioned after Paris' Dîner en Blanc, Noche en Blanco is downtown Phoenix's version of the global dinner party phenomenon where guests are encouraged to wear white and convene at an iconic local space. In the four previous iterations of Noche en Blanco, that iconic local space has been Hance Park; however, the ongoing pressures of COVID-19 have necessitated a move to a live and interactive fundraising television production.

Guests are encouraged to host mini Noche en Blanco dinner parties at their homes or an off-site location while adhering to the latest public health recommendations. Access to the production is free and guests are encouraged make donations and participate in the interactive event. Event guests can begin donating now and find more information, including the link to the livestream, by visiting nocheenblancoaz.com.

The interactive production will highlight the Hance Park's surrounding arts, cultural and historic landmarks. The showcase of multi-cultural music and dance performances will be live streamed from the main stage of Phoenix Center for the Arts at Hance Park. Additionally, performances by students from Arizona School for the Arts, The Maine rock band, Mariachi Pasion and ending with Noche en Blanco's famous dance party grand finale with the headliner of the Phoenix Afrobeat Orchestra. More multi-cultural music and dance performances will be announced leading up to the event.

For the development and execution of the [Hance Park Master Plan](#), a core component of the Conservancy is to raise non-public funds benefiting the park. Noche en Blanco is the major fundraiser event that the conservancy leans on. Read the [Hance Park Newsletter](#) for more information.

2020 APS Electric Light Parade Will Feature a Reimagined Format



For more than three decades, the [APS Electric Light Parade](#), presented by the Phoenix Parks and Recreation Department, has been an event where families, neighborhood groups and businesses from across the city come together to celebrate the joy of the holiday season.

Event organizers announced Thursday they will modify the production of this year's 34th annual parade, which is typically held on the first Saturday in December and present it as a television and video stream-only experience. Despite this temporary change, this year's event will still include all the excitement and cherished traditions of the in-person event that attracts hundreds of thousands of spectators annually.

Media partner [ABC15 Arizona](#) is scheduled to air a 60-minute special presentation on Sunday, Dec. 6 at 4 p.m., that will include video from the 2019 parade along with new content and holiday messages from community leaders and organizations.

The program will re-air on ABC15 Arizona on Friday, Dec. 25, and also be broadcast on [CW61 Arizona](#) and [PHXTV \(Ch. 11\)](#) during the month of December. The schedule for those broadcasts will be available at a later date. The community can follow event programming updates by visiting [Phoenix.gov/ELP](#).

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

Economic Development & Education

Last week, two airlines announced they would initiate new flights to Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport. On Nov. 15, Southwest Airlines will begin service to Palm Springs International Airport two to three times each day. On Dec. 17, American Airlines will begin new seasonal service to Loreto International Airport in Baja California Sur, Mexico. On Dec. 19, American Airlines will begin seasonal service to La Paz International Airport. Flights to both destinations are scheduled to operate through May 2.

From Oct. 22 through Nov. 4, the Phoenix Convention Center will host a voting location for the November General Election through the Maricopa County Elections Department. Staff anticipates 1,500 attendees at the center, which will be available for drop-off and in-person voting. Hours of operation are available online at <https://recorder.maricopa.gov/pollingplace>.

This week, Communications staff has been working to place ads promoting the COVID-19 mobile testing van on the displays in the checkout lanes of Bashas' and Food City locations. In one month, the ads have been played 164,000 times with approximately 213,000 views.

This week, Communications staff continues to highlight COVID-19 services and resources on PHXTV. Additionally, staff is working to produce videos highlighting small businesses who have received Coronavirus Relief Fund awards, Halloween safety, and anti-bullying messages for the PHXTV Classroom.

On Oct. 22, Arts and Culture staff presented the third of five free “Public Art: Behind the Curtain” workshops in October. Artists Brad J. Goldberg, Robert Behar, and Rosario Marquadt discussed their approach to developing public art projects. The workshops are open to all and take place every Thursday at 10 a.m. Those interested can register on the Office of Arts and Culture website.

This week, Arts and Culture staff continued enhancements and maintenance of the public art collection. Staff has completed lighting maintenance on *Her Secret is Patience* at Civic Space Park. They are also working with Parks and Recreation staff to remove graffiti at Arizona Falls, and with Public Works to coordinate lighting options for the Tuckey Teapot gazebo, a dispersed public art project along the bicycle path near State Route 51 and Glendale Avenue.

During the week of Oct. 12, the Phoenix Families First Resource Centers hosted 20 virtual workshops focused on early language, literacy, child development, early learning, parenting, and family stability. A total of 12 families, with children up to five-years-old, participated.

Social Services Delivery

During the week of Oct. 12, Human Services staff conducted 1,981 wellness checks and delivered more than 2,880 meals to 576 senior center members.

On Oct. 14, Human Services staff held the second virtual City of Phoenix Memory Café for eight senior center members and their care partners in support of the City’s Dementia Friendly Initiative. The goal of Memory Café is to provide members with an interactive activity to stimulate their cognition and develop a support system of individuals with similar experiences. This week, participants recalled a childhood memory and enjoyed a music therapy exercise.

To date, Library staff has provided curbside pickup services to more than 137,000 customers, with approximately 1.3 million physical library materials circulated by library cardholders.

This week, in partnership with St. Mary’s Food Bank Alliance, Library staff served 695 meals to children and teens, ages 18 and under. The Kid’s Café program is the result of a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture administered by the Arizona Department of Education. Meals are being provided Monday through Saturday during curbside pickup hours at select library branches.

Public Safety

On Oct. 17, a Police Recruit Written Exam was administered at the Police Regional Academy. Results were provided immediately following the exam and the 25 applicants that passed were invited to submit their AZPOST background packet. Police recruitment remains open for applicants to register for written exams scheduled Oct. 29 and Nov. 6, as well as the ongoing online option.

On Oct. 20, Phoenix Firefighter Bashaar Al-Khouri was awarded 2019 Firefighter of the Year for his role in fighting two fires in December 2019. On Dec. 15, Al-Khouri and Engine 910 responded to an apartment fire where he worked with his crew to rescue four trapped citizens. Then, while responding to another rapidly spreading apartment fire on Dec. 23, Al-Khouri played a paramount role in rescuing three people from a second-story balcony, where they were trapped with their egress blocked by heavy fire. Both fires were extremely dangerous and Firefighter Al-Khouri went above and beyond the call of duty to save lives.

On Oct. 12, Fire staff hosted their first academy class since the start of the COVID-19 outbreak in Arizona. Class 2020-2 is comprised of 39 recruits who will be trained over the next 16 weeks, with graduation set for Jan. 29.

Neighborhoods and Livability

This week, Sustainability staff assembled the Urban Forest Implementation Team (UFIT) to view the release of the new “Walk Shed” tool, which ranks every street in Phoenix for its calculated likelihood for pedestrian traffic based on density, nearby stores, and transit dependency, with a layer for heat vulnerability. UFIT will use the walkshed maps to prioritize tree planting projects in vulnerable communities.

On Oct. 7, Neighborhood Services staff were awarded \$369,509 in Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) CARES Act Funding from the Arizona Department of Housing. These funds allow staff to assist low-income households, prioritizing services for residents above 60-years-old, people with disabilities, and families with children at or below 5-years-old. Staff plans to assist approximately 49 households to prevent, prepare for, or respond to home energy needs surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.

During the week of Oct. 12, Parks and Recreation staff hosted three tournaments at sports complexes citywide, serving 62 different teams. Staff hosted 71 allocations and on flat-land athletic fields citywide and scheduled 82 maintenance staff for 328 hours to conduct secondary cleaning on adjacent restrooms. During the week of Oct. 19, staff is currently scheduled to host 71 allocations and four tournaments at sports complexes so far.

In October, Parks and Recreation staff will host two Halloween events. On Oct. 24, staff will hold Drive Thru Boo at Paseo Highlands Park with 30 trunk-or-treat cars and City partners on-site to distribute candy and hold free giveaways while supplies last. On Oct. 5

30, the same event will be held at Maryvale Park. Each event is expected to host families in vehicles to come through and enjoy the festivities. Staff, volunteers, and members of the public in attendance are required to remain socially distanced, wear masks, and follow all Center for Disease Control and local guidelines to mitigate the spread of COVID-19.

During the week of Oct. 12, Parks and Recreation staff began the recertification process for lifeguards who intend to return for the 2021 season. Currently, 107 returning employees have received information to begin the online course. The first in-water skills session will take place on Oct. 16. During the in-water sessions, lifeguards will demonstrate their competencies completing rescue skills necessary to become a lifeguard.

Infrastructure

On Oct. 15, the extended voter registration deadline was reached in Arizona. Since the last citywide election in August 2019, 94,903 additional voters have registered in Phoenix, bringing the total number of Phoenix registered voters to approximately 859,556.

On Oct. 28 and 29, Water Services staff will host virtual public meetings on the Drought Pipeline Project from State Route 51 to Bell Road, to update residents on the construction schedule, potential impacts and what to expect. Both meetings will offer the same information and attendees are encouraged to register in advance at phoenix.gov/droughtpipeline.

On Oct. 12, rebuilt traffic signals were activated at the intersections of 5th Avenue and Van Buren Street and 5th Avenue and Adams Street as part of the 3rd and 5th Avenues improvement project. These signals will facilitate the new two-way lane assignment between these intersections and accommodate new bus routes.

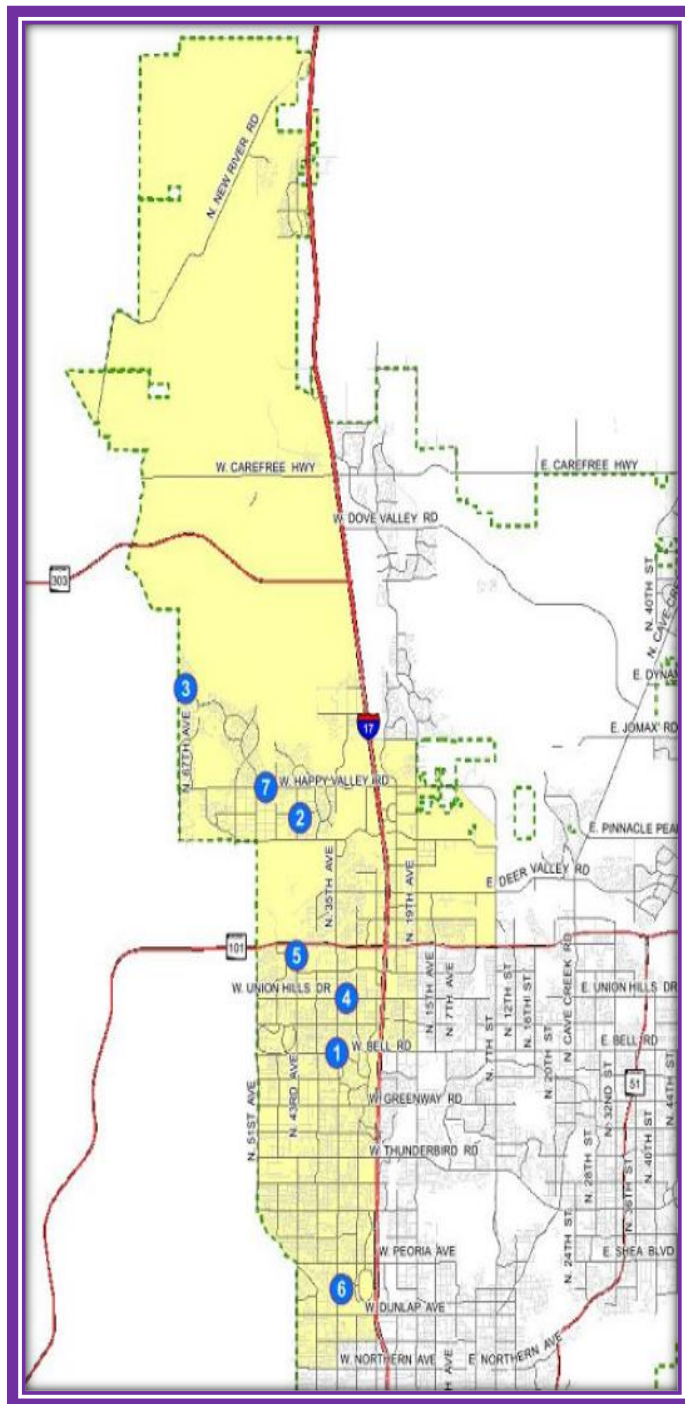
