PHOENIX ELECTION INFORMATION


The City of Phoenix will hold the regularly scheduled Mayor and Council Election on Tuesday, Nov. 3, 2020. In this election, registered voters who reside in the city of Phoenix will elect a Mayor and decide any ballot measure propositions referred by the City Council. Also, voters residing in City Council Districts 1, 3, 5 and 7 will elect Council Members.

The Nov. 3, 2020 election will be a County-conducted election. All candidate races and any propositions will appear on Maricopa County's ballot for the November General Election. If no single candidate receives a majority (50% +1) of the votes for the office they are running for during the Nov. 3, 2020 election, the top two candidates that received the most votes will advance to a runoff election to be held on March 9, 2021 (City-conducted election).



PHOENIX COMMEMORATES 150 YEAR TOWNSHIP ANNIVERSARY

150 years ago, this week, on Oct. 26, 1870, the Phoenix Townsite was designated with a population of about 240 residents. On Monday, Oct. 26, 2020, Mayor Kate Gallego, Councilwoman Laura Pastor, Councilwoman Williams, City Manager Ed Zuercher and Phoenix historian Steve Schumacher marked the sesquicentennial anniversary with news conference.

Over the past year, Councilmembers Pastor and Williams met with a small group to plan for what we hoped would be a great celebration, but a global pandemic changed all of that as it has changed many aspects of our lives and we worked with a scaled back celebration. Around downtown you will see historic banners highlighting the anniversary.

Phoenix's history is a story of people who were industrious, hardworking, imaginative, and enterprising. Long before pioneers and settlers mapped out a townsite, Phoenix was home to a thriving Hohokam civilization. The Hohokam engineered miles of irrigation canals that made desert land arable and stood the test of time; the Phoenix pioneers used the same canal design and we are still using it today for the modern Arizona Canal and Central Arizona Project Canal.

A rapid influx of pioneers continued to move to the area and by 1870, it was clear that a townsite had to be selected. At that time, a handful of farmers formed the Salt River Valley Association to determine the best place for a new townsite. On Oct. 20, 1870, a meeting was held to select a site. The settlers identified 320-acre section of land for a townsite. Six days later on Oct. 26, 1870, the townsite as officially selected and designated.

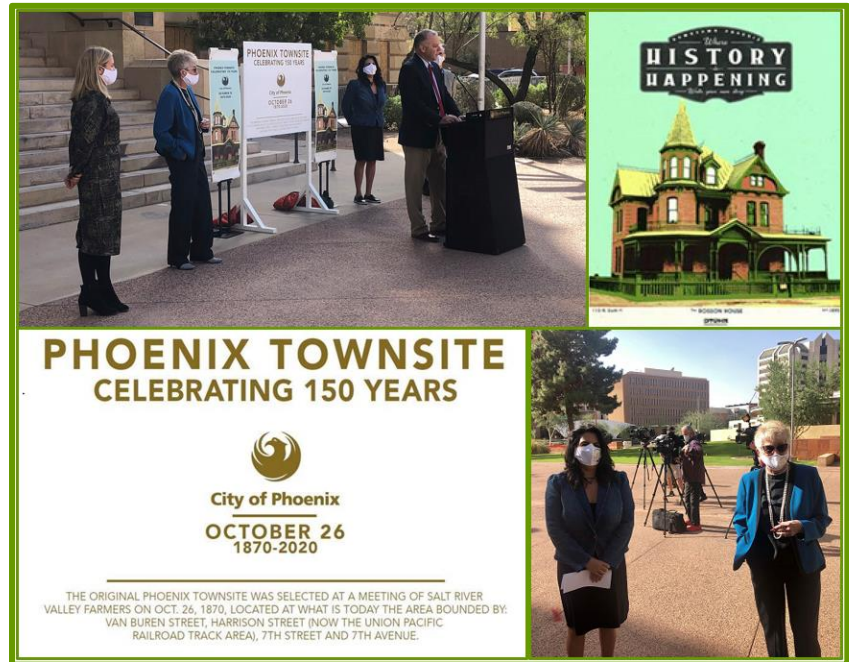
They ultimately chose the area bounded by Van Buren Street, Harrison Street (now the Union Pacific Railroad track area), 7th Street and 7th Avenue. The townsite was laid out in a grid pattern and the systematic design truly laid the foundation for how the city grew over the next 150 years.

In 1870 a temperate climate, reliable water source and regional commerce attracted investment and increased settlement. 150 years later that is still the ingredients for development that Phoenix experiences.

After the Townsite was established, the pioneers of that time planted the first cottonwood tree, family residences were built with the townsite limits, a courthouse was built, a store, a brewery, a hotel and more.

Phoenix, in the midst of a forbidding desert, on the ruins of a prehistoric culture began to rise again.

Supporting Victims:

What Can I Do If Someone I Know is Experiencing Sexual or Domestic Violence?

Don't be afraid to let them know you are concerned for their safety.

Tell them you see what is going on and you want to help. Help them recognize what is happening is not normal and they deserve a life free from violence.

Acknowledge they are in a very difficult and scary situation.

Let them know the abuse and/or assault is not their fault. Reassure them that they are not alone and there is help and support available.

Be supportive.

Listen to them. Remember it may be difficult for them to talk about the violence. Let them know you are available to help whenever they may need it. What they need most is someone who will believe and listen to them.

Be nonjudgmental.

Respect their decisions. Do not criticize their decisions or try to make them feel guilty. They will need your support even more during these times.

If they end the relationship, continue to be supportive of them.

Even though the relationship was abusive, they may still feel sad and lonely once it ends. They will need time to mourn the loss of the relationship and will especially need your support at that time.

Encourage them to talk to people who can provide help and guidance.

Find a local sexual assault or domestic violence program that they can connect with. If they have to go to the police, court, or a lawyer, offer to go with them for moral support.

Remember that you cannot "rescue" them.

Although it is difficult to see someone you care about get hurt, ultimately, they have to be the one to decide what they need to do and when.

Discuss safety concerns with them.

Remember that a survivor knows their situation best. It's important to talk with them about how to access resources for identifying safety plans. You may have ideas about what they should do but it's important that you allow them to make their own choices.

Phoenix Wins PR World Gold Award for COVID-19 Response Efforts



The city of Phoenix recently was named the 2020 Gold Winner in the category of Best Government Response-Helping People and Businesses During COVID-19 by [Public Relations World Awards \(PRWA\)](#).

This annual award recognizes outstanding work in agency and in-house public relations, corporate communications, and marketing and investor relations from around the world. Because of the pandemic, PRWA created new categories to honor the contributions of individuals, teams and organizations that have demonstrated creativity, resourcefulness, and innovative thinking to assist the public in dealing with the impacts of COVID-19.

To date, the COVID-19 Mobile Testing Van has administered more than 17,000 tests at 55 different locations since its launch in mid-August. For the drive-thru testing, 75 events have been held in city-owned parks, as well as schools and churches. PUBLIC TRANSIT

Pre-COVID Bus Services Resume

On Oct. 26, the partial restoration of public transit services began, following the approval from City Council. Phoenix will work with Valley Metro to coordinate these changes. The following service changes will be implemented:

Hours

Morning bus service on Phoenix-operated routes will return to a start time of approximately 4 a.m. on weekdays and 5 a.m. on weekends.

Added Trips

RAPID service will begin with the restoration to the I-17 route, with one inbound trip in the morning and one afternoon outbound trip. Public Transit staff will continue monitoring ridership closely to determine if additional trips are needed for additional RAPID routes in the future.

On-board Adjustments

Designated seats will now be marked as ‘unavailable’ to facilitate social distancing, rather than a specific limit of riders on each bus.

Other safety measures and cleaning protocols implemented throughout the pandemic will continue. Face covering are also still required on all public transit services, including bus, light rail, paratransit, Dial-a-Ride, and vanpools. The Public Transit Department continues working jointly with the riding public to ensure a clean, safe, and comfortable ride. For complete information visit www.valleymetro.org.

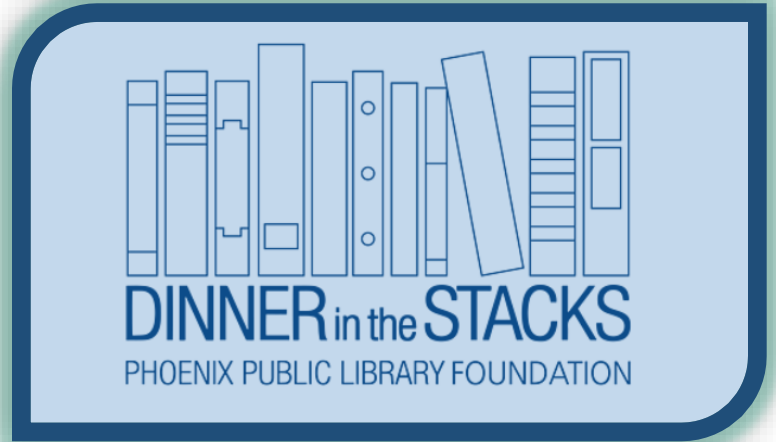

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

Economic Development & Education

During the week Oct.19, Aviation staff continued efforts to reduce the spread of COVID-19 at Sky Harbor International Airport. Staff deployed 10 sanitizing wipe dispensers to the entrances and exits of security checkpoints. In addition, staff distributed 3,200 individually bagged masks, provided by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, to Terminal 3, Terminal 4, and the Rental Car Center.

During the week of Oct. 19, the Phoenix Families First Resource Centers hosted 16 virtual workshops focused on early language, literacy, child development, early learning, parenting, and family stability. A total of 18 families, with children up to five-years-old, participated.

On Oct. 29, Arts and Culture staff presented the last of five free “Public Art: Behind the Curtain” online workshops for October. It featured artist Joe Willie Smith discussing his approach to developing public art projects. The workshops are open to all and those interested can register on the Office of Arts and Culture website. In November, the workshops will feature attorney Sarah Conley Odenkirk discussing issues related to law, business practices and the arts.

Social Services Delivery

Recently, Fire staff established immunization clinic sites designated as “pockets of need” due to large numbers of children and adults for whom immunization services are scarce. Efforts to increase flu vaccinations within the county, especially for high-risk adults, are intended to lessen flu hospitalization rates during the COVID-19 pandemic. The program increases the capacity for data entry, reminder recall activities, and vaccine cold storage capacity as well as provide for supplemental adult flu vaccination activities. The City will be reimbursed up to \$20,000 for these services.

Since Sept. 1, Housing staff has offered new and existing landlords the opportunity to earn a \$500 signing bonus for all newly completed Housing Assistance Payment Contracts. As of Oct. 15, 42 incentives have been paid to landlords. Four of these landlords are new to the Section 8 program, four of these contracts housed homeless veterans, and four of these contracts housed chronically homeless persons.

During the week of Oct. 19, Human Services staff conducted 2,034 wellness checks and delivered 2,935 meals to 587 senior center members.

To date, Library staff has provided curbside pickup services to more than 144,000 customers, with approximately 1.4 million physical library materials circulated by library cardholders.

This week, in partnership with St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance, Library staff served 736 meals to children and teens, ages 18 and under. The Kid's Café program is the result of a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture administered by the Arizona Department of Education. Meals are being provided Monday through Saturday during curbside pickup hours at select library branches.

This week, Library staff connected virtually with 126 children, teens, and adults to promote the Phoenix Public Library annual “Amazing Library Card” campaign. The campaign primarily consists of outreach to classrooms and schools, plus city-wide promotion efforts, in support of issuing new library cards. This year's campaign runs from Oct. 1 through Oct. 31.

Public Safety

On Oct. 29, a Police Recruit Written Exam will be administered to approximately 78 applicants. Police recruitment remains open for applicants to register for written exams scheduled Nov. 6, Nov. 21, as well as the ongoing online option.

This week, Fire staff was awarded C.A.R.E.S. Act funds to expand the Decontamination Section. This funding will allow the section to purchase a truck, trailer, and decontamination equipment to house a unit at Station 41. This provides the Phoenix Fire Department with two strategically located decontamination units.

Neighborhoods and Livability

On Oct. 19, Neighborhood Services staff, in partnership with Local Incentives Support Group (LISC) Phoenix, launched the Phoenix RISE Microbusiness Grant. The grant application offers low-income microbusiness owners up to \$10,000 in funding. As of Oct. 21, more than 100 applications had been received by LISC, who will submit eligible applications to Neighborhood Services staff for final grant approval.

During the week of Oct. 19, the Parks and Recreation staff hosted three tournaments at sports complexes citywide, serving 64 different teams. Staff hosted 450 allocations and 91 reservations on flat-land athletic fields citywide and scheduled 55 maintenance staff for 220 hours to conduct secondary cleaning on adjacent restrooms. During the week of Oct. 26, staff is currently scheduled to host 64 allocations at sports complexes so far.

During the week of Oct. 26, Phase II of the invasive plant removal mitigation within the Rio Salado Habitat Restoration Area will occur. The focus will be on the Wetland Ponds area and mitigation includes removal of Pepper, Tamarisk, Palm Trees, Giant Arundo, Buffelgrass and Stinknet, and spraying herbicide on targeted invasive plants. Non-targeted plants will not be sprayed. The mitigation is funded through a grant from Arizona State Parks and Trails.

From Nov. 14 to Nov. 20, the 2020 Phoenix Summit Challenge will be administered virtually as a week-long opportunity for outdoor enthusiasts of all abilities to hike multiple summit trails throughout the City's preserve land. So far, more than 800 participants have registered for the event. This annual event helps to raise dedicated funding for the more than 41,000 acres of desert park and mountain preserve land located throughout Phoenix. This year, participants will track their hikes by using the interactive online Walker Tracker application, which will provide a fun, engaging and self-directed experience through which participants can choose where and when they complete their hikes.

On Oct. 24, Parks and Recreation staff hosted Boofest, an annual event at Paseo Highlands Park, as a free, socially distanced, drive-thru event. Attendees decorated vehicles and showed off their costumes, while event staff distributed candy bags. Staff asked participants to remain in their vehicles, wear face coverings, and follow physical distancing guidelines. A total of 255 cars drove through the event and 989 candy bags were distributed.

Infrastructure

This week, City Clerk staff finalized voter registration totals. For the November 2020 elections, the final total is 861,377 active registered voters in Phoenix.

This week, Central Station closed, and services were relocated to the Transit Building. Public Transit staff continued communicating service and bus stop location changes to the public, as a result of the Central Station redevelopment and South Central/Downtown Hub projects (Pardon our Progress campaign). Public outreach

included City of Phoenix and Valley Metro newsletters, website announcements, billboards, digital signs, social media, PHXTV, and in-person signs and flyers.

This week, as part of the Cool Pavement Pilot program, Street Transportation staff applied cool pavement seal in Quarter Sections 29-37 from Shea Boulevard to Cholla Street and 40th to 44th Streets. Staff expects to complete the installation of all nine cool pavement locations by the end of October. The pilot project involves the application of cool pavement seal coating to streets in eight neighborhood areas and Esteban Park to test how the material performs in the Phoenix climate, and whether it is sustainable and effective at reducing the urban heat island effect.

COUNCIL DISTRICT 1 NEWS AND INITIATIVES

DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME ENDS

This weekend, the majority of the nation (except Arizona and Hawaii) is preparing to "fall" back one hour in time. To help end this part of the cycle of Daylight Savings Time, now is a great moment to remind everyone to change the batteries in their home smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

Batteries should be changed out at least twice a year in these safety devices to ensure their effectiveness. Please also check the device itself as most manufacturers of these devices recommend a change-out of these detectors every 8-10 years. Take a moment this weekend to install a fresh battery and blow off the dust and cobwebs.

Does your family have an Evacuation Plan in place? In the event of everyone needing to get out of the house during an emergency, does your family know how best to respond? Spend a dinner one night this week together as a family and talk about how everyone would get out of the house during a house fire and where does everyone assemble during a crisis....It could be life saving for you and your family.
