## INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

To ensure that students have internet access during the global pandemic, the city of Phoenix has expanded its Wi-Fi coverage outside of nearly 50 libraries, community, senior, and recreation centers. Residents and students can now sit in parking lots and public areas outside of participating facilities to connect their devices daily from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. and participate in distant learning and online education.

### How to Connect Your Device

This public information page provides the [names and locations of participating city-owned facilities](#) and FAQs to help bridge the digital divide.



Wi-Fi users may walk up to connect outside of the city building, while others may drive into the parking to connect from their car. The Wi-Fi signal is strongest closer to the building. To use this service, you need a wireless device such as a laptop computer, smart phone, or tablet.

Connection steps may vary by device. Generally, users should locate the network and internet setting on the device. When searching for the available city Wi-Fi network, look for **PHXCITYWIFI** and connect to it. Open a browser and enter any URL to access and accept the user agreement. There is no password required.

When connecting at a Phoenix Public Library location, use one of these corresponding network names:

- Cesar Chavez, Cholla, Ironwood, Juniper, Mesquite, Palo Verde, Saguaro: **library2-free-wifi**

## WATER SERVICES

### Help Stop Illegal Dumping into the Sewer System

Dumping oil, fuel and solvents into the sewer harms the environment and can cause severe damage to your neighborhood. Illegal sewer dumping has become an increasingly large problem in Phoenix. Wrongdoers dump later at night or during low traffic times.

When someone illegally disposes of waste, the wastewater treatment plant may not be able to treat the water adequately leading to the discharge of solvents, fuels, and oils that can inhibit or kill the micro-organisms. These organisms are vital part of breaking down organic matter in the treatment process.



It can also cause permit exceedances that can lead to the City of Phoenix to be fined by Arizona Department of Environmental Quality or the Environmental Protection Agency costs that could be passed down to residents.

It affects everyone including the safety of workers. The sewer is not just a series of pipes. There are manholes, metering stations and sampling vaults that require employees to work in as confined space entrants. Fumes from fuels or solvents dumped in the sewer can be harmful to employees.

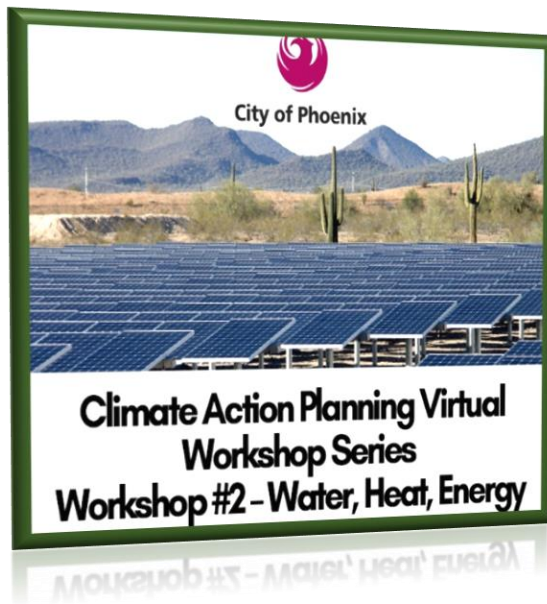
Wastewater treatment plants expend a lot more time, energy (electricity), and chemicals to treat wastewater containing fuel, oil, and solvents. The additional time needed to clean and treat illegally dumped substances is costly and can affect future costs for all residents.

All fuels, solvents and oils must be recycled or hauled off and disposed of by a licensed waste hauling company.

## **CITY MANAGER’S REPORT:**

### **Legislative**

Maricopa County conducted the Nov. 3, 2020, election and continues to process ballots countywide. The remaining ballots to be counted include provisional ballots, military and overseas ballots, braille ballots, large print ballots and damaged ballots. The canvass of the vote by the Phoenix City Council is scheduled for the Nov.18 Formal Council Meeting.

This year, Government Relations staff assisted City departments and local nonprofits with 81 grant applications to the Gila River Indian Community (GRIC) and the Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation. Between the two tribes, Phoenix-sponsored applications were awarded \$888,030 in tribal grants, of which \$202,030 directly funded two City programs. Of the 61 applications submitted to GRIC, the Human Services Family Advocacy Center was awarded \$183,030 for the Crime Victim Assistance program to purchase clothing, gift cards and bus passes for victims of crime. This is the first time GRIC selected the Family Advocacy Center for funding and it is the only city application to be selected this year. Of the 20 applications that were submitted to the Fort McDowell Yavapai Nation, the Human Services Business



and Workforce Development Division was awarded \$19,000 to provide Phoenix youth an opportunity to participate in a paid five-week internship with a community business during the summer months.

### **Economic Development & Education**

On Nov. 12, Arts and Culture staff hosted their second professional development workshop with private attorney Sarah Conley Odenkirk discussing Dealing with Conflict. The November series covers legal and business issues for artists and arts organizations, and takes place every Thursday at 10 a.m. Those interested in participating can register on the Office of Arts and Culture website.

Aviation staff continues to improve communication of COVID-19 updates to travelers and staff. The Sky Harbor International Airport website has been updated with operational changes, such as pre-travel COVID-19 testing for passengers of American Airlines and Hawaiian Airlines flights.

Last week, two airlines announced new flights to Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport. On Dec. 20, American Airlines will begin nonstop services to Little Rock, Arkansas. In January, Spirit Airlines will begin nonstop service to Orange County John Wayne Airport seven days per week.

### **Social Services Delivery**

To date, Library staff has provided curbside pickup services to more than 156,000 customers, with approximately 1.5 million physical library materials circulated by library cardholders.

This week, Library staff hosted online Storytime sessions. During these sessions, 284 children and adults shared books, literacy activities, songs and stories.

This week, in partnership with St. Mary's Food Bank Alliance, Library staff served 673 meals to children and teens, ages 18 and under. The Kid's Café program is the result of a grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture administered by the Arizona Department of Education. Meals are being provided Monday through Saturday during curbside pickup hours at select library branches.

On Nov. 6, Housing staff hosted a pop-up Mobile Pantry Distribution event at the Aeroterra Community Center. In addition to the monthly St. Mary's Mobile Pantry Distribution event, 117 residents received a food box with a variety of items that included milk, yogurt, oranges, and other non-perishables.

On Dec. 2, Housing staff will begin distributing tablets to seniors at Fillmore Gardens. Staff purchased 800 tablets with Coronavirus Relief Funds to provide senior public housing residents with digital access for telemedicine, online services and social media. The residents will receive a tablet, case, user guide, mask and hand sanitizer during the appointment-based distribution events.

On Nov. 5, Housing staff hosted a free community spay and neuter clinic at Aeroterra Community Center. Staff partnered with Dr. Kelly's Mobile Unit and Fix, Adopt, Save to provide free sterilization and vaccines services. In total, 16 families and 23 companion animals were assisted with these free services. In addition, four community feral cats living at A.L. Krohn were fixed with funds provided by AZK9 to control the feral cat population in the Edison-Eastlake Community.

During the week of Nov. 2, Human Services staff conducted 2,008 wellness checks and delivered 2,785 meals to 557 Senior Center members.

## **Public Safety**

On Nov. 6, a Police Recruit Written Exam was administered to 30 applicants at the Police Regional Academy. Those who passed the exam were invited to submit their AZPOST background packet. Police recruitment remains open for applicants to register for written exams scheduled Nov. 21 and Dec. 4, as well as the ongoing online option.

From Nov. 9 – 18, Fire staff will host Operation Mass Flu Vaccination at its facilities citywide.

## **Neighborhoods and Livability**

Recently, Environmental Programs staff obtained an Individual Clean Water Action Section 404 Permit and Section 401 Water Quality Certification for operations and maintenance at the city's Tres Rios Habitat Restoration Area. This permit and certification streamline the approval process for management and maintenance at Tres Rios. Obtaining the permit required close coordination with Water Services staff, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality.

This week, Sustainability staff released the quarterly [Sustainability Newsletter](#) to subscribers highlighting projects from departments across the City including Cool Pavement, the BRT Program, the Green Business Program and the Climate Action Plan Framework. Additionally, staff began promoting the city's Electric Vehicle Education and Awareness campaign, as well as significant price discounts from dealers on electric vehicles this fall.

During the week of Nov. 2, Parks and Recreation staff hosted five tournaments at sports complexes citywide. Staff hosted 506 allocations and 86 reservations on flat-land athletic fields citywide and scheduled 83 maintenance staff for 332 hours to conduct secondary cleaning on adjacent restrooms. During the week of Nov. 9, staff is currently scheduled to host 66 allocations at sports complexes so far.

On Nov. 1, Parks and Recreation staff installed new golf cart vinyl barriers at all city-operated golf courses. The barriers provide a safer environment when two players share a golf cart.

## **Infrastructure**

This week, the Center for Digital Government announced Phoenix as a Top 10 Digital Cities winner for the '500,000 or More Population Category.' The 20th annual Digital Cities Survey examines the overall technology programs and plans of cities, focusing on twelve categories ranging from aligned leadership to cybersecurity, data governance and transparency. New this year, the survey called for narratives about each city's COVID-19 response. Phoenix has a history of placing in this Top 10 national competition.

On Oct. 29, Street Transportation staff activated the city's 1,156th new traffic signal at 57th Drive and McDowell Road. The signal serves the Academy of Math and Sciences and the neighborhood on the north side of McDowell Road, providing a safe crossing for the school children and flashing yellow arrows for left turns off McDowell Road. This project also included concrete work to alter the service road on the opposite side of the street where some parents would typically drop off their children.

This week, Planning and Development staff published the latest Ethnic Heritage Story Map featuring Hispanic Heritage maps, which are the third in a series. In the mid-2000s, the Historic Preservation Office commissioned inventories of ethnic heritage properties within the city of Phoenix. The results of those surveys have been published, along with a video series accompanying the [story maps](#).

### I-17 ramps to eastbound Loop 101 closed this weekend Nov 13 – 16

The Arizona Department of Transportation advises drivers to plan ahead for the closure of the ramps from north- and southbound I-17 to eastbound Loop 101 from 10 p.m. Friday, Nov. 13, to 5 a.m. Monday, Nov. 16, for Loop 101 Pima Freeway widening construction and maintenance work.

#### DETOURS:

- Drivers on northbound I-17 can exit at Union Hills Drive and continue east to SR 51 to access eastbound Loop 101
- Drivers on southbound I-17 can exit at Deer Valley Road and continue east to Cave Creek Road then south to access eastbound Loop 101

ADOT advises drivers to **slow down** and **use caution** around construction personnel and equipment while work is underway. Schedules are subject to change based on weather and other unforeseen factors. For more information, please call the ADOT Bilingual Project Information Line at 855-712-8530.

### ADOT to close state routes 366, 473 for the winter on Monday, Nov. 16 - State routes 67, 261, 273 to close by end of the year

With the winter months rapidly approaching, the Arizona Department of Transportation will close State Route 473 in the White Mountains area and State Route 366, also known as Swift Trail, heading up Mount Graham in southern Arizona for the winter on Monday, Nov. 16.

State Route 67 leading to the North Rim of the Grand Canyon will close on Dec. 1, while other White Mountains area highways such as state route 261 and 273 will close by Dec. 31. These highways could close sooner depending on the weather.

ADOT closes these highways annually as part of the agency’s winter shutdown schedule due to significant amounts of snowfall these regions typically receive.

## **COUNCILWOMAN WILLIAMS UPDATE: ENVIRONMENTAL CLEANUP**

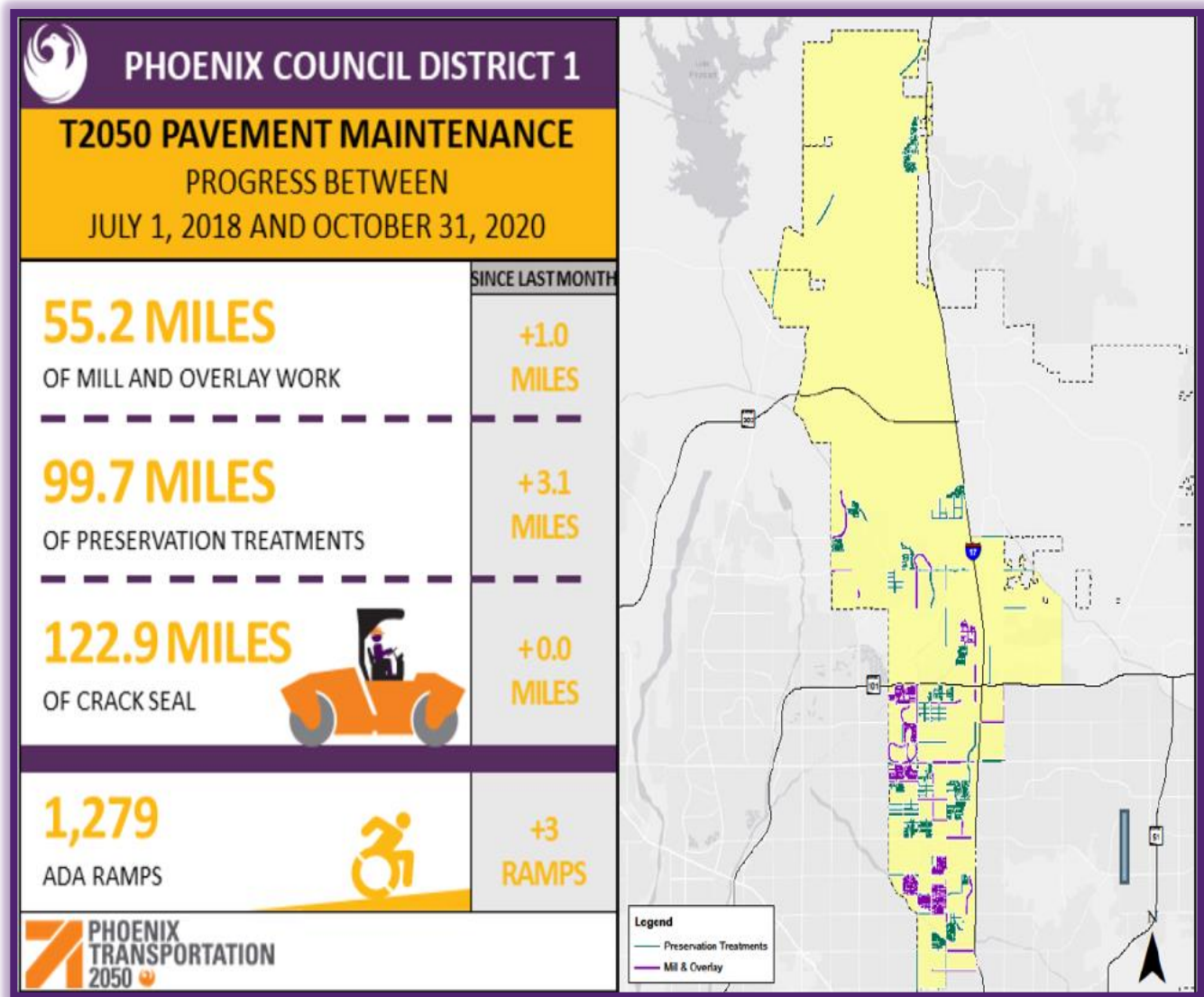
