MODERN TERMINAL 3 HOME OF STAINED GLASS REVIVAL

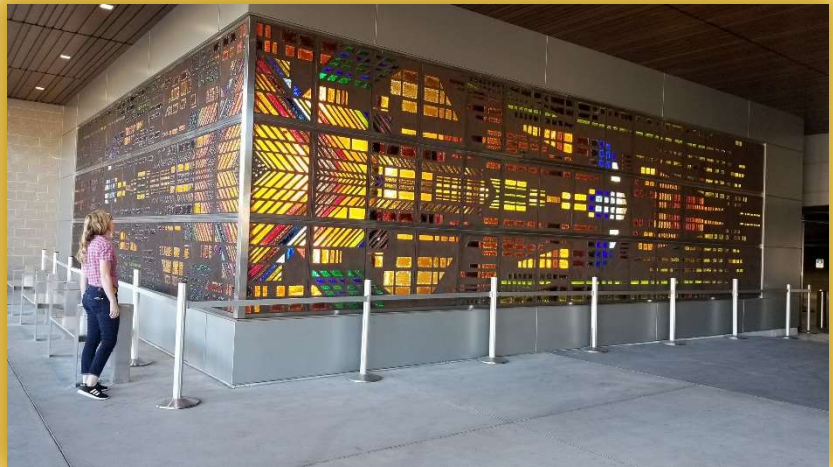
Terminal 3 at Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport is still undergoing its modernization program but a classic look will complement its new appearance with the debut of a new stained glass wall.

The east arrivals plaza on the north curb is the site of the art installation by Ken Toney, an Arizona glass artist who for decades created architectural stained glass installations. Toney is responsible for the 1,400-square-foot stained glass ceiling that was in Terminal 3 from when it opened in 1979 to when that section of the terminal closed for modernization in late 2016.

Now, the glass installation lives again as it is repurposed for this new artwork.

Toney is known for the creation of uniquely designed stained glass windows in several Phoenix-area churches and the original Maricopa County Courthouse.

The type of art glass Toney uses is called *Dalle de verre*, which is also known as slab glass. The material is substantial: It's produced by casting molten glass into 1-inch-thick slabs, 8-by-12 inches. The edges are often chipped or faceted to increase the reflection or refraction of light passing through. Glass window and wall panels are fabricated by arranging cut shapes of slab glass into the desired pattern and then a matrix of epoxy, silica and aggregate is poured between the pieces to adhere them together.



Once dried and cured, the panels are strong and durable and can be arranged in a metal framework.

The geometric design of the new stained-glass wall is in the same symmetrical arrangement as when it was a ceiling inside Terminal 3. It will now be a major way-finding exterior element, viewable on the north curb of the terminal.

This installation is a part of the permanent Phoenix Airport Museum collection, which, at more than 900 pieces, is one of the largest airport art collections in the United States

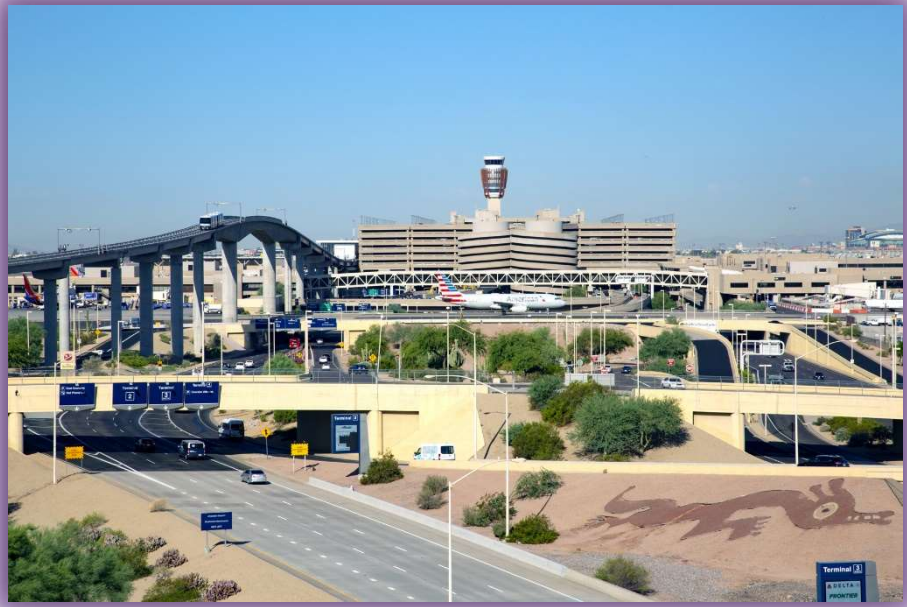

WALL STREET JOURNAL RANKS AMERICA'S FRIENDLIEST AIRPORT NUMBER ONE IN THE U.S.

Phoenix Sky Harbor International Airport is honored to be named the top airport in the nation among large airports by the Wall Street Journal. Convenience. Reliability. Value. These are critical factors the Wall Street Journal looked at when conducting its annual Airport Rankings study. It examined 14 different measures within these categories, as well as surveying more than 2,500 subscribers. The results found that among other things, Phoenix Sky Harbor's short taxi-to-takeoff times, restaurants and fast WiFi makes it the top airport in the country.



“Phoenix Sky Harbor earned this recognition because of its commitment to outstanding customer service and passenger satisfaction. Investments in our airport’s technology, infrastructure and local dining options underscore the efforts that our talented Aviation staff have made in providing an exceptional customer experience,” said Councilwoman Thelda Williams, chairwoman, Transportation, Infrastructure and Innovation Subcommittee.

Phoenix Sky Harbor ranked particularly high for its average Yelp rating for restaurants. *America’s Friendliest Airport* is also *America’s Tastiest Airport* with local favorites like Barrio Café, La Grande Orange, Four Peaks Brewery, Matt’s Big Breakfast, San Tan Brewery, the Tavern and others in the terminals as well as nationally-recognized options available.

Phoenix Sky Harbor also saw a major improvement in its WiFi speeds, something that is very important to travelers. PHX was ranked second among the largest airports for WiFi service.

With great weather, PHX also had favorable on-time arrivals as well as low taxi-to-takeoff times, making it a very reliable airport.

With a focus on providing world-class customer service to every customer every day, Phoenix Sky Harbor currently has a nearly \$2 billion capital investment program underway to help elevate the passenger experience. Among these projects is the modernization of Terminal 3. Earlier this year, a new South Concourse opened with all new shops, local restaurants, customer amenities like access to charging stations from nearly every seat, a Delta Sky Club, a Children’s Play Area and more. The renovated North Concourse will open in 2020, thereby completing the project. Also in process is the extension of the PHX Sky Train® to the Rental Car Center and a new eight-gate concourse to be occupied by Southwest Airlines at the Airport’s busiest terminal, Terminal 4.

PLAN FOR I-17 WEEKEND CLOSURE NEAR PINNACLE PEAK ROAD

Bridge removal means drivers should plan ahead, use alternate routes

A stretch of Interstate 17 in north Phoenix will be closed over the weekend of Nov. 15-17 while crews remove a bridge at Pinnacle Peak Road that the Arizona Department of Transportation is replacing with a new structure.

I-17 will be closed in both directions between Deer Valley and Happy Valley roads from 10 p.m. Friday, Nov. 15, to 10 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 17.

Drivers should expect heavy traffic and, to save time, consider alternate routes farther away from the following primary detour routes that will be in place for the I-17 closure:

- Northbound I-17 traffic can detour by exiting at Rose Garden Lane/Deer Valley Road and traveling east on Deer Valley Road, north on 19th Avenue and west on either Happy Valley or Jomax roads to reach I-17.
- Southbound I-17 traffic can detour by exiting to eastbound Jomax Road and using southbound 19th Avenue to westbound Deer Valley Road to reach I-17.

Crews will remove the old Pinnacle Peak Road bridge over I-17, which is being replaced by a new crossing that is being built as part of a \$50 million project to reconstruct the freeway interchanges at Pinnacle Peak and Happy Valley roads. Plans call for Pinnacle Peak traffic to switch to a new bridge span over I-17 by Sunday evening, Nov. 17.

Pinnacle Peak Road will be closed at the same time of the I-17 weekend closure. All on- and off-ramps at the Pinnacle Peak interchange will be closed to traffic.

The demolition and removal of the old Pinnacle Peak Road bridge at I-17 will clear the way for a second span over the freeway to be added as part of the ongoing project. The side-by-side bridges will allow room for two through lanes and turn lanes in each direction when the project is completed in fall 2020.

The I-17/Happy Valley Road interchange also is undergoing reconstruction with the use of a diverging diamond design.

The project is part of the Maricopa Association of Government's 20-year Regional Transportation Plan approved by county voters in 2004.

City of Phoenix Supports Art Contest for Popular Children's Book Series

Jeremy Jackrabbit, the beloved children's book character, is back! Jeremy Jackrabbit Travels Safely is the newest title in a series of Jeremy Jackrabbit adventure books, and the latest story highlights the importance of pedestrian safety.

With the support of District 1 Councilwoman Thelda Williams and District 7 Councilman Michael Nowakowski, the City of Phoenix has partnered with local authors, Sasha and Rodney Glassman, to hold an art contest to promote the latest book in the series and showcase the talent of Phoenix-area youth.

Artwork will be selected to illustrate the book that will be published by the Glassman's in 2020. More than 50,000 copies of the book will be distributed for free to each kindergarten student in Maricopa County.

"Pedestrian safety is a top priority and it is important to constantly educate all who share the road." Councilwoman Williams said. "Sharing an important message successfully takes strong partnerships; I'm grateful that the Glassman's have stepped up to this project and that our sponsors and partners are providing support."

Youth artists may enter up to two drawings done in any art medium. Illustrations may be in color or black and white, but may not be larger than 11x17 inches. Colored backgrounds are preferred. Artwork may be submitted at select Phoenix community centers or by mail by Friday, Nov. 22, 2019 at 5 p.m. The text of the book, which should be used by youth as a prompt for their artwork, contest entry form, submission locations and additional information is available at <https://www.phoenix.gov/parks/jeremyjackrabbit>.

The pedestrian safety message shared in the book and an opportunity to submit artwork for publication will be integrated into the city's Parks and Recreation Department [Phoenix Afterschool Center \(PAC\)](#) curriculum this fall. PAC is offered at school sites citywide. Experienced city recreation staff lead structured activities and provide homework help for youth ages 6 to 13 during afterschool hours.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:

Economic Development & Education

On Nov. 6, Aviation's 2019 bond issue was successfully priced at \$1.1 billion which will be the largest issue in the airport's history. The proceeds will finance the PHX Sky Train, Terminal 3 Modernization, the S-1 Concourse at Terminal 4 and a new hangar for police aircraft at Phoenix Deer Valley Airport.

On Nov. 6, Aviation staff hosted the 19th Annual Volunteer Appreciation lunch to recognize over 450 Navigators and Navigator Buddies for volunteering at Sky Harbor over the course of the past year. The luncheon included a special performance by Irish music group DeMairt Carol.

During the week of Oct. 28, Community and Economic Development staff coordinated site visits for the Taiwan-USA Industrial Cooperation Promotion Office Taiwanese Delegation that was visiting Phoenix. The visiting Taiwanese companies met with numerous business leaders including Stryker, Nikola, Mayo Clinic, and toured the Phoenix Biomedical Campus, Park Central and the newly-opened WearTech Applied Research Center.

From Nov. 6 to 12, Phoenix Convention Center hosted approximately 3,800 delegates at Learn Serve Lead: Association of American Medical Colleges Annual Meeting. Learn Serve Lead is the signature learning and networking event for all those who care about the future of academic medicine.

On Nov. 7, Phoenix Convention Center hosted approximately 1,600 attendees for the Arizona Future Business Leaders of America conference. The conference included over 60 innovative, hands-on, specialized sessions available to attendees.

On Nov. 2, Library staff hosted the “Just Read Local Author Fair.” The event was attended by 870 individuals and included 70 authors from all over the state of Arizona and learned about their books, including children, teen, adult fiction and non-fiction.

On Nov. 13, Library staff hosted a program at Century Library on American Indian Code Talkers from 1 to 2:00 p.m. The event included a presentation by an educator from the Heard Museum on the American Indian Code Talkers and how their actions helped assure victory in the South Pacific during WWII.

Neighborhoods and Livability

On Oct. 26, Neighborhood Services partnered with Phoenix Revitalization Corporation to support the Palomino Neighborhood Association street clean-up along the route students take to Palomino Elementary and Palomino Middle School.

This week, Planning and Development staff launched a new and improved “Fees, Valuations and Assurances” page on the Planning and Development Department’s customer-facing external internet page: <https://www.phoenix.gov/pdd/devfees>. The page provides customers with information about fees, contact information, payment types that are (and are not) accepted, and other helpful information.

On Oct. 30, Arts and Culture staff presented a free community workshop “Public Arts 101” at Park Central (3121 N. Third Ave.). The workshop provided professional development for over 30 artists interested in transitioning their work from studio practice to public art. This Public Art 101 Workshop covered all the basics of the public art process, from application through design and fabrication.

Social Services Delivery

This week, Library staff, in partnership with St. Mary’s Food Bank Alliance, served 318 meals to children, ages 5 to 18, as part of the Kid’s Café program. Served Monday through Saturday, meals are accompanied by an educational enrichment program presented by Library staff.

This week, Human Services staff assessed 10 vulnerable/homeless individuals for case management and community-based resources from PHX C.A.R.E.S. caseworkers at Burton Barr Library.

On Nov. 9, Library staff hosted the Dinner in the Stacks fundraising event sponsored by the Phoenix Public Library Foundation at Burton Barr Central Library beginning at 6:30 p.m. The event supports literacy and Phoenix Public Library programs and services through a unique dinner experience.

This week, Housing staff provided over 30 families resources on financial literacy, vocational training, and employment opportunities during the iWORK Harvest Fest. The event also included a book giveaway of 25 books distributed to residents.

Public Safety

On Nov. 6, Phoenix Fire staff partnered with Phoenix Children’s Hospital to organize an EMS/MVP Symposium from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. The event was hosted by the Phoenix Suns at the Talking Stick Resort Arena. The symposium prepared Phoenix’s robust first-responder network for pediatric-specific emergencies.

On Nov. 6, Phoenix Fire staff conducted a presentation to approximately 50 fifth and sixth grade students at Herrera Elementary School (1350 S. 11th St.) on the benefits of becoming a first responder.

Infrastructure

This week, Water Services staff installed two segments of ultraviolet-cured CIPP liners to repair cracks in the gravity sewer located in the street in front of Sky Harbor International Airport Terminal 4. This repair was completed in under four hours during nighttime hours without the need to dig and replace the pipe.

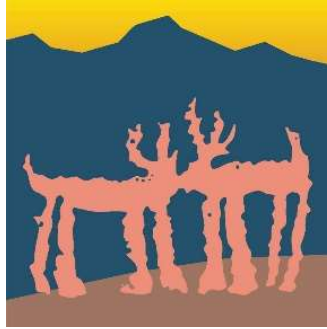
